Course Description:

This course is a continuation of the study of accounting principles and procedures essential to the preparation of financial statements with particular emphasis on the corporate form of business. Topics of coverage include Liabilities, Stockholders' Equity, Earnings per Share, Investments, Revenue Recognition, Accounting for Taxes, Leases and Pensions, and Statement of Cash Flows. Prerequisite: ACC 321 and a minimum of 55 semester hours of credit.

Course Embedded Assessment Objectives:
