Course Description: This course focuses on legal principles governing real estate transactions including estates in land, ownership rights, landlord/tenant relations, restrictions of use, sales contracts, deeds, and mortgages. Emphasis is on the practical skills needed by paralegals to perform all types of real estate transactions, ethical considerations for a paralegal working in this area, and emerging computer applications and resources in real estate practice.

Course Objectives:

- 1. To give students a basic overview of property law issues.
- 2. To expose students to the role and ethical obligations of the paralegal in real estate transactions.
- 3. To expose students to document preparation and emerging computer applications

Students should be able to demonstrate comprehension/understanding of these areas through class room discussion and test results. Students will also research legal issues to be presented by the instructor then draft office briefs/memos concerning the issue. Students will become familiar with various computer programs utilized in day to day law office operations.
