Course Description:

UNCO 111 prepares students for optimal success at the university and beyond by motivating them to develop skills, knowledge and behaviors that will create confident, self-sufficient learners.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Students will demonstrate critical thinking by asking and answering higher-level questions and solving increasingly complex problems.
- 2. Students will improve their listening, speaking, writing, and reading skills.
- 3. Students will demonstrate habits of the mind that produce academic improvement across the semester.
- 4. Students will acquire the knowledge and apply the necessary skills to successfully navigate university life.

5. Students will take ownership of their learning experiences and develop greater awareness of self and others.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional / Methods / Activities Assessments

Instructional Methods: Class consists of various styles of presentation and interaction. In UNCO 111, students will be active participants regardless of the mode of instruction. Students should come to class ready to participate, both in terms of preparation as assigned and with a positive attitude toward class and colleagues.

Assignments:

Attendance and participation: Roll will be taken each class day and students are expected to attend all scheduled class periods. Students should make arrangements to be in class on time and to stay until the class is dismissed. Attendance is part of your participation grade for UNCO 111.

For students with excused absences, which include participation in a University-sponsored event, illness accompanied by a doctor's note, death in the student's immediate family, a verifiable court appearance or any other similar circumstance in the view of the instructor, written documentation must be turned in to the instructor immediately upon return to class.

Students must attend all class sessions and participate to the extent possible in each class activity. The activities in this course are designed to help you improve your communication skills and increase your knowledge in order to make you a more effective and successful college student.

Three Event papers: event papers worth 50 points each, documenting attendance in three different types of university events (athletic, academic, cultural, etc.) and must be 2 pages in length (50 points each/ 10 points of which are from the writing center form). Students are required to go to the writing lab for help with each paper and turn in the writing lab form for 10 points. Details of required event activities and their due dates are listed in the weekly plan (in eCollege) for the course. (150 points)

Patrick Dougherty project & paper: Beginning on January 16, TAMU-C will be hosting acclaimed artist Patrick Dougherty to install a temporary public artwork on our campus. Mr. Dougherty's work has been shown nationally and internationally and we are very excited to bring his work to our community. The installation process will take three weeks and as part of this class we are going to assist in the installation of the project. You will participate in the Patrick Dougherty project by volunteering for two hours at the site to help with the installation. A four page typed paper will be turned in at the end of the semester. This paper will include your

thoughts about your experience participating on the project, information you researched about the artist, Patrick Dougherty (document your sources), and your critical analysis of the total project. **(100 points)** Students are required to go to the writing lab for help with this paper and turn in the writing lab form for 10 points. Details of the required due date is listed in the weekly plan (in eCollege) for the course.

Exam: Students will have a final exam in this course over the materials presented. **(100 points)**

ON-LINE DISCUSSIONS: On Monday of each week a discussion question will be posted that relates to the reading assignments or activities for that week. Students have until midnight (central time) the following Sunday of each week to respond to the discussion question. Students are minimally expected to type at least one response to the question to receive 6 points. To receive 7, 8, 9, or 10 points, students are expected to "engage" in the discussion by asking other students questions and/or responding to the posts of other students and/or the professor. To earn these points students must post some type of response to the question as well as a comment/question that is on topic and contributes to the overall discussion (see rubric below).

Online discussions are not the same as texting or tweets. They should reflect critical thinking and contain complete sentences that are grammatically correct with as few spelling and punctuation mistakes as possible. Do not use slang or popular abbreviations such as btw, lol, etc. Discussions will be worth a total of 150 pts. Always be polite and courteous when responding to someone else's comments or questions.

NOTE: Online discussions should not be viewed as similar to a discussion around the dinner table with friends or family where everybody expresses their views, opinions, and beliefs on some topic often, which they know absolutely nothing about. This is an academic course and your discussion topics are directly linked to the reading assignments in your textbook. Consequently, your posts should reflect a certain amount of knowledge on the topic based on research, facts, and data. It is fine to critique, interpret, and occasionally interject an opinion or two, but for the most part, this should be an academic and intellectual discussion of the topic at hand.

Grading Rubric for Online Discussions:

Did student respond to question posed? (6 pts)

Does the response reflect critical thinking, facts, and data as opposed to just personal opinion? (2 pts) Does the student's response add to and/or stimulate other discussion? (1pt) Is the response grammatically correct and free of abbreviations and spelling error? (1pt)

*Late work: 10 points will be subtracted from all unexcused late work

Grading:

Students' course grade will be calculated according to the following scale:

A = 720-800 Points

B = 640-719 Points

C = 560-639 Points

D = 480-559 Points

F = 479 Points or less

I utilize the Grade book feature in eCollege, so students will be able to view grades for each assignment as soon as I post them. However, be mindful that the grading scale in the course (see above) DOES NOT correspond to the percentages of points displayed in eCollege. If you strive for a specific grade in the course, be sure to notice how many points you need to accumulate to achieve that grade rather than focusing on the percentage of points you have earned in eCollege.
