Course Text

Course Description

This course provides a general overview of the major counseling theories, an introduction to counseling techniques, the conditions that facilitate an effective counseling relationship, stages in the counseling process, and professional ethics.

Objectives

Goals/Rationale of the Course

- 1. The student will become familiar with various aspects of the counseling relationship.
- 2. The student will recognize and understand the purpose and need of counseling theory.
- 3. The student will become familiar with traditional and more recent counseling theories and their application to the counseling process.
- 4. The student will become familiar with cultural considerations within each theory.
- 5. The student will become familiar with the ACA Code of Ethics.

Student Learning Outcomes

The student will:

- 1. Be an active and engaged participant in discussions by analyzing, constructing/creating, and evaluating information presented within the textbook, external readings/resources, student research, and class activities and sharing personal observations and opinions.
- 2. Become familiar with professional peer-reviewed Counseling journal publications and APA style of writing
- 3. Identify basic counseling theoretical orientations and their founders

FLEXIBLE COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Method of Instruction

This course will utilize lecture, class discussions, role plays, experiential activities and possibly, video demonstrations, to achieve the learning objectives.

Assignments

Exams (100 pts. Each): There will be 2 exams for the course. Questions will consist of a mix of multiple choice, true/false, fill-in-the-blank, short answer, and matching type questions. Exams will be completed in class on the day the exam is scheduled. There will be **NO MAKE-UP EXAMS**

Theory Presentation (100 pts.): Students will complete a presentation covering a theory of counseling that has been assigned to them. Presentations can be done utilizing any method comfortable to the student (Power Point, Prezi, white board, etc.). At a minimum, the student will provide a handout to the class and cover the following:

- 1.) Major contributors/developers
- 2.) Major works/titles/research
- 3.) Key concepts/theoretical underpinnings
- 4.) Therapeutic techniques and procedures

Presentations are to be 20 minutes in length at a minimum and no more than 30 minutes. Students may use video as part of the presentation, but will still be expected to cover all aspects of the assignment and stay within the time limits.

Theory of Change Paper (100 pts): Double space, 12 pt. TNR, use correct spelling and grammar, include a cover page, staple (no plastic covers, binders etc.). Paper length should be about 3 pages. This is an opinion paper however, there needs to be demonstration of effort in the work submitted. Address in your paper your opinion on how people change (i.e., what's necessary for change to take place)? In addition, address what's most important as it relates to being an agent of change (i.e., techniques/interventions, or the therapeutic relationship between client and therapist).
