

English 457-001 Teaching English as a Second Language Fall 2015

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Course Description:

This course offers wide exposure to the linguistic, psychological, and sociocultural aspects of teaching English to speakers of other languages. The course surveys historical and current trends in the methods of teaching and evaluating ESL, language testing, and language programs. The course is also appropriate for students interested in teaching a second or foreign language.

Course Objectives:

- To improve the student's understanding of the principles applied in the teaching of a second language
- To learn different teaching methods and techniques for teaching ESL students
- To be able to use teaching materials, methods, and techniques for teaching ESL students
- To be able to recognize what materials, methods, and techniques are best for ESL students

Class Activities, Assessments and Outside Assignments

In-Class Presentation:

After learning and practicing several teaching methods, students will do one in-class presentation. Students will be given the option to select one method for teaching English as a second language. The information will be taken from Larsen-Freeman. More information and handouts will be given in class. All students will be given a specific date to present, any absent student will get a zero (0). No exceptions.

Essay:

Students will receive several topics for their essay and will be given the freedom to select their own topic. They will write a two-three page essay. The professor will not accept late papers. No exceptions. All papers are due on Thursday, November 26th. Students will send their papers through e-mail. More specific information will be given in class.

Outside Class Assignments:

Students are required to read and work in all assignments listed in this syllabus. Students must remember that they will be quizzed on these assignments. All written assignments are due when class begins. No exceptions.

Quizzes:

The quizzes and attendance and participation grade come together. After a quiz, a class discussion will follow. That discussion will accrue points for extra credit. There is no make-up for extra credit. Unless there is an extreme circumstance, there are no make-ups for the quizzes. No exceptions. Please know that the instructor, not the student, will decide the "extreme circumstance." To mend a bad grade, one of these quizzes will be dropped.

Chapter Exams:

There will be several chapter exams during the semester. Most of them cover several chapters from each text. Though the exams contain several chapters, these exams are not comprehensive. That means that when a chapter is included in a test, that chapter will not appear in another test. The dates for these exams are given in this syllabus. There are no make-ups for these exams; therefore, any absent student will receive a zero (0) for such exam. No exceptions. All exams will count.

Attendance:

Coming to class is not an option. This class is very strict about attendance. Students will be allowed to be absent once. Extra credit will be given for attending this class. Two tardies, no more than thirty minutes each, will count as an absence. Any student who is late (more than thirty minutes) will be counted absent. No exceptions. Any student who is absent more than twice will be dropped from this class.

In-class Participation:

This class requires active participation. Students are expected to be ready to participate in all class activities. The participation grade will be given as extra credit. To earn extra credit, students must be present. Any student who misses more than two classes will not receive extra credit. Any student who is present but is not prepared to answer questions will not receive points for participation.

Final Exam:

A final exam will be given at the end of the semester. The final exam covers Larsen-Freeman's text. Chapters 12-15 are included in the final exam. There are no make-ups for this exam. Absent students will get a zero (0) for this exam. The exam should take no more than two hours for its completion. If a student arrives thirty minutes after the exam begins, that student will not be allowed to take the exam.

Use of Electronic objects in the classroom:

Cheating will not be tolerated in this class. Any student who cheats once in any quiz will receive a zero (0) for that quiz. If the student cheats again, he or she will receive a failing grade in this class. If a student cheats once on any of the chapter exams, including the final exam, that student will get a zero (0) for that exam. If the student cheats again, that student will get a failing grade in this class. All cheating students will be reported to the Dean.
