Course Description

This course is designed to help build basic financial management knowledge for students who have never completed an undergraduate financial management course. We will start with a review of accounting. Next, we analyze financial statements in order to identify a firm's strengths and weaknesses. We then move to financial leverage and financial forecasting concepts, as well as theories for managing current assets and current liabilities. The second half of the course is devoted to time value of money concepts and methods companies use to choose acceptable investment projects.

University Catalogue Description

This course is designed for nonbusiness undergraduate degree holders to prepare for making financial decisions. Basic concepts of finance are applied in both the public and private sectors. Graduate students will learn about financial analysis, financial forecasting, asset management, financial markets and security valuation (including state and local bonds). This course satisfies the finance background requirement for the MBA candidates and may be appropriate for graduate programs in a field other than business administration.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of the fundamental concepts of corporate finance and its principles and methods.
- 2. Understand and apply valuation techniques of securities, projects and corporations.
- 3. Demonstrate an understanding and show ability to measure financial decisions in a risk/return environment.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional / Design of Course

The class will be conducted in a lecture/discussion format. This course is taught in two locations concurrently. The instructor well telecast the course to the campus in Commerce from the campus at UCD. The majority of lectures will be live in class. Attendance is required at all times. Note that the instructor will supplement live lectures with online videos for certain advanced topics in the course. Be prepared to discuss and ask questions about the material assigned for each class period. Students should look in eCollege and their university e-mail for course updates.

Students are expected to be read the book prior to class.

Student Responsibilities

Students are expected to be engaged in the class by watching the lectures and asking questions on the discussion board. It is up to the student to increase his/her knowledge in finance. Given the difficulty of this material, you will NOT pass this class without regular reading (prior to class). Grading

This is a graduate class and absolutely no late work will be accepted. If you miss an exam then it will be a zero. It is possible that curves will be given on exams, but there will be no extra credit work.

There will be three exams including the final. You will be responsible for information from class discussion, required readings, and any guest speakers. Please adjust your schedule to allow time for the exams. **There** are absolutely no makeup exams.

You will receive quizzes during the semester; these should introduce you to the types of questions you will experience on your exams and will count towards your grade. These quizzes will include text questions and/or supplemental activities.
