Welcome to ACCT 562, Forensic and Investigative Accounting, where we will study how to use accounting information and methods to: (1) describe types of financial fraud schemes and risks; (2) identify the rules of evidence and civil procedure as they relate to successful forensic and expert testimony; and, (3) determine amounts of commercial or economic damages.

Prerequisites for our class are ACCT 321 and ACCT 322, ACCT 502, or equivalent classes.

Our textbook is Forensic and Investigative Accounting, 7th edition, by Crumbley, Heitger, and Smith, ISBN 978-0-8080-4073-6, and published by Commerce Clearing House. Other useful materials are posted in our eCollege page.

Our class will meet at UCD on Monday nights from 6:15 to 8:55. A schedule of class meetings, homework, and tests appears below. Homework assignments are to be submitted to our eCollege page. Tests will be taken in class on the four dates identified in our class schedule.

Final grades will be determined by the average of four numbers: (1-4) the four test grades; and (5) the average of the five homework grades. Averages above 90% will earn an A; 80% is required for a B; and 70% for a C. Averages below 70% will earn a D or, if less than 60%, an F.

During our first class meeting, you will be asked to prove your understanding and acceptance of our academic honesty and our class objectives, policies, and schedule policy by posting a statement on our eCollege page. Your acceptance is not a factor in your grade, other than you may not continue in our class without agreeing to comply with our class polices.

Homework grading is based on evidence of diligent effort. You may receive full credit for answers if timely, complete, and relevant to the questions asked. Untimely answers may not receive credit. Please do not leave questions blank.

Timely requests for time for homework or tests are always granted. Untimely requests for time require evidence of unforeseeable and unpreventable facts preventing timely homework or test answers.

Homework is a combination of narrative and objective questions. Tests are multiple choice questions, generally taken from old CFE exams.
