Course Description:

The social, cultural, and stylistic history of rock and roll music. The class begins with important precedents such as jazz and blues. In addition to addressing styles actually sold under the rock marketing label, we will cover genres and styles that were influenced by rock and roll but sold under different labels, such as soul, funk, salsa, disco, and hip-hop. Attention will also be given to global varieties of rock and roll.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- Relate rock and roll music to its social and cultural through reading assignments, online discussion, and concert reports in response to live performances.
- Aurally identify elements of rock style from various eras and genres through guided listening exercises and online discussion.
- Expound and defend critical positions on individual pieces or performances of music through.

Student Expectations and Required Technology:

- To fully participate in online courses you will need to use a current Flash enabled internet browser. For PC and Mac users the suggested browser is Google Chrome or Mozilla Firefox.
- You will need regular access to a computer with a broadband Internet connection. The minimum computer requirements are:
 - o 512 MB of RAM, 1 GB or more preferred
 - Video display capable of high-color 16-bit display 1024 x 768 or higher resolution

- You must have a:
 - Sound card, which is usually integrated into your desktop or laptop computer
 - Speakers or headphones.
- Both versions of Java (32 bit and 64 bit) must be installed and up to date on your machine. At a minimum Java 7, update 51, is required to support the learning management system. The most current version of Java can be downloaded at: JAVA web site http://www.java.com/en/download/manual.jsp
- At a minimum, you must have Microsoft Office 2013, 2010, 2007 or Open Office. Microsoft Office is the standard office productivity software utilized by faculty, students, and staff. Microsoft Word is the standard word processing software, Microsoft Excel is the standard spreadsheet software, and Microsoft PowerPoint is the standard presentation software. Copying and pasting, along with attaching/uploading documents for assignment submission, will also be required. If you do not have Microsoft Office, you can check with the bookstore to see if they have any student copies.
