- 2. Score Study Materials
 - a. Conductor's marked score. A copy of your conductor's marked score should be turned in to the professor before each conducting opportunity.
 - b. Conductor's analysis flowchart. A copy of your conductor's analysis flowchart should be turned in to the professor and passed out to your classmates before each conducting opportunity.
- 3. Reading Assignments will be made. Students are expected to participate in the class discussion each class based on information in each reading assignment. The written final exam will be taken from the reading assignments and class discussions.
