ESCI 1303 - (ESCI 101) - A systematic study of minerals, rocks, and the processes which shape and modify the surface features of the earth. Energy, plate tectonics, volcanoes, earthquakes, and the practical aspects of geology are studied as they relate to man's adjustments to the geologic environment.

Course Outline: Topics of instruction will be internal Earth, rocks and minerals, structures, earthquakes, volcanoes, effects of wind and water, etc.

Student Learning Objectives:

Students will be able to discern between relevant and irrelevant information, recognize bias in source material, and critically examine a diversity of source material:

Students are assigned a research paper that they must compare articles to understand both sides of an geological/environmental issue.

In written, oral, and/or visual communication, A&M-Commerce students will communicate in a manner appropriate to audience and occasion, with an evident message and organizational structure:

Students are asked to do a Powerpoint presentation over an environmental geology issue. This is done for/under the supervision of the instructor.

Students will be able to interpret, test and demonstrate principles revealed in empirical data:

Students are given certain information about an area, ex: rock type, fossils, geologic structures, etc. and they are expected to deduce the geologic history of the area.

Students will be able to work together toward a shared purpose relevant to the course or discipline with a sense of shared responsibility for meeting that purpose:

Students will be assigned a group activity, each will have to do their share to complete the project.
