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COURSE INFORMATION

Materials – Textbooks, Readings, Supplementary Readings:

Textbook(s) Required: *Juvenile Delinquency: A Sociological Approach* (10th Edition). by William E. Thompson and Jack E. Bynum. 2017, ISBN-9781442265004 Rowman & Littlefield

Course Description: The study of the nature extent, causation, treatment, and prevention of juvenile delinquency. Recommended background courses: CJ 101 or SOC 1301.

Student Learning Outcomes: After completing this course students should be able to:

1. Apply a sociological and criminal justice perspective on juvenile delinquency to the causation, nature and extent of delinquency, the juvenile court, and possible control, treatment, and prevention strategies;

2. Make general sociological analyses of specific types of delinquency and juvenile offenders;

3. Provide a brief overview of the Texas Juvenile Code and the Juvenile Justice System in Texas; and compare/contrast it with other states;

4. Apply critical thinking skills to the problem of delinquency and express their ideas in written and oral communication.

5. Use critical thinking skills to assess current trends in juvenile delinquency and develop a plan with policy implications for "rethinking" the problem of delinquency.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructor's Expectations of Student

- 1. Attend class regularly
- 2. Read material before class
- 3. Active participation in discussions (not just "I agree/disagree")

Instructional Methods

The method of instruction for this course will be a combination of lectures, discussions, films and group activities. The specific activities used to engage students in mastering chapter material will be classroom participation, discussion boards, five unit exams and a research paper as assigned.

There will be five examinations. Each examination will contain multiple essay questions. The final will contain multiple essay questions. Each examination will be weighted equally.

You will also submit a six-ten page paper at the end of the semester. It is not to be an argumentative or opinion paper, but a research paper. This paper must be written based on a discussion and analysis of a course related issue. Please, use APA format writing style for this paper. The paper will be graded on content as well as exposition. There will be a 20 point penalty for late submission.

LearningStudio Notifications

- 5. All assignments must have a standard header inserted into the document that contains your complete name, class, CRN, Professor's full name, assignment date, and assignment name.
- 6. Please, include a cover page for any paper handed to your Professor
- 7. You may consult APA style manual located in reference section at the Gee Library
