Course Description (6 Credit Hours)

This course introduces the student to the use of the nursing process in the care of adults with chronic or non-complex illness. A systems approach is used to discuss the effects of illness on the individual and the family, and to examine the disruption of growth and development patterns across the lifespan from young adult to senior years. The course includes clinical experience to allow the student the opportunity to apply theoretical concepts to clinical practice in diverse adult populations.

Student Learning Outcomes

At the completion of Nursing Care of Adults I, the student will be able to:

- 1. Synthesize applicable nursing and non-nursing theories and concepts from liberal education to build an understanding of the human experience.
- 2. Identify the impact of attitudes, values, and expectations on the care of older adults, and other vulnerable adult populations.
- 3. Promote factors that create a culture of safety and caring for clients from diverse populations in rural areas.
- 4. Implement patient and family-centered care around resolution of endof-life and palliative care issues, such as symptom management, support of rituals, and respect for patient and family preferences.
- 5. Advocate for high quality and safe patient care as a member of the interprofessional team.
- 6. Give examples of relevant evidence based practices, particularly as they relate to nursing care of patients with disorders of physiological systems.
- 7. Describe ethical and legal principles impacting health care for adults, including informed consent, diminished autonomy, individual freedom of choice, and confidentiality.
- 8. Apply the nursing process to individuals experiencing acute and chronic illness.
- 9. Utilize critical thinking skills to identify concepts related to the disruption of growth and development, physiological disorders and psychological disorders for adults.
- 10. Assume and demonstrate accountability for personal and professional behaviors in classroom and clinical.

Clinical Objectives

At the completion of the clinical rotation, the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate professional standards of moral, ethical, and legal conduct.
- 2. Demonstrate professionalism, including attention to appearance, demeanor, respect for self and others, and attention to professional boundaries with patients and families as well as among caregivers.
- 3. Implement holistic, patient-centered care that reflects an understanding of ethical and legal issues, human growth and development, pathophysiology, pharmacology, medical management, and nursing process management across the health-illness continuum, for adults in the acute hospital setting.
- 4. Deliver compassionate, patient-centered, evidence-based care.
- 5. Create a safe care environment that results in high quality patient outcomes.
- 6. Provide appropriate patient teaching that reflects developmental stage, age, culture, spirituality, patient preferences, and health literacy considerations to foster patient engagement in care.
- 7. Demonstrate critical thinking skills in implementing evidence-based nursing interventions as appropriate for managing the acute and chronic care of adult patients.
- 8. Demonstrate the application of psychomotor skills for the efficient, safe and compassionate delivery of patient care.
- 9. Monitor client outcomes to evaluate the effectiveness of psychobiological interventions.
- 10. Collaborate with other healthcare professionals and patients to provide appropriate health promotion and disease/injury prevention interventions.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional Methods, Activities, and Assessments

This is a blended course without lecture requiring students to complete online activities and independent study to be successful. Course objectives may be met through individual study using suggested resources, active involvement in classroom activities, formal, and informal exchange of ideas with classmates and colleagues regarding specific topics as well as utilizing critical thinking skills. Teaching methods include seminar, discussion, small group work, independent study of texts and library resources, computer-assisted instruction, audio-visual aids, return demonstration, clinical assignments and supervision, post clinical conferences and check-off of appropriate skills and the assignments listed. While the professor will

provide guidance and consultation, the student is responsible for identification of learning needs, self-direction, seeking consultation and demonstration of course objectives.

Tips for Success in the Course

Regularly logging into the course website, checking email, and announcements daily, weekly study, attendance and participation is expected.

Meet with your instructor if you score 75 or below on any quiz or assignment.

The HESI Fundamentals Exam must be passed with a score of 900 or greater. If you do not achieve this score, you will have to undergo remediation and retesting as indicated in the Student Guide.

LearningStudio Notifications

Course Specific Procedures CLASS

UNSATISFACTORY CLINICAL PERFORMANCE

1. There are several infractions that might lead to a student being given a clinical warning for the day, including but not limited to:

Nursing Care of Adults I Assignments

Types of Course Assignments and Purpose of Each: There is a variety of assignments for this class to meet the learning outcomes and to accommodate different learning styles. The rubrics for written assignments will be posted in eCollege. Usually class meeting will occur on Tuesday unless otherwise noted. You are expected to come prepared to class. The quiz or exams will occur on Monday unless otherwise noted.

Quizzes (7) 10% each

70% Total

There are seven quizzes in this class. They will cover the content topics as identified on eCollege. Utilize the module objectives on eCollege to study. Each quiz will have 2-4 dosage calculation items. The questions will be in multiple formats: multiple choices, multiple answer, matching, etc.

Final Exam (1)

A comprehensive exam will be provided at the end of the semester

Assignments (15) 1 % each

15% Total

The assignments include Evolve Case Studies (13), Certificate (1), and STD Quiz (1). The assignments will help students to develop and improve critical thinking skills in nursing. The CS and assignments and must be completed and submitted on Evolve/eCollege by 2359 on the due date indicated. You must complete the case study by the due date and receive at least 75% to receive credit for the assignment. In addition, there are 2 modules (STD, Pressure Ulcer/Wound) on ecollege that you must complete and submit a screen shot of the quiz or certificate into the appropriate drop box NLT 2359 on the date assigned. The due dates of the assignments are posted in the course calendar.

Group Presentation (1) per group

10%

The purpose of the group presentation project is to learn about the unique clinical presentation of various disease processes. The presentation will allow the students to identify evidence based research to support the nursing patho-concept map and specific interventions. Each designated group will be assigned a client case. The group will choose client specific evidence-based information to develop the patho-map and to support a current nursing intervention.

The presentation must include three (3) nursing <u>research</u> articles from 2010-2016 that relate to the chosen intervention. The articles have to be **peer-reviewed** and come from a **nursing journal** or have a **registered nurse** as the one of the first three authors. The rubric for the assignment will be provided in the Group Presentation module. All members of the group will receive the same grade. However, a student can be removed

from his/her team if the other students in the group come to the instructor and report that a student is not doing his/her fair share of the work. If that happens, the student will be notified in writing by the instructor. The student will then be responsible for doing the assignment on his/her own. Utilize the rubric as part of your guide for formulation of the presentation. The groups and the case will be assigned by the instructor by January 23. The rubric will be in eCollege in the module titled 'Rubrics'. The presentations due April 25th.

For first time HESI scores of 950-999, you will receive 2 extra points and for scores of 1000 and greater, you will receive 3 extra points added to your final course grade. You must achieve an average of 75% or better on your quizzes and exam before the extra credit points will be added.

Clinical Assignment Types: There are a variety of assignments for this clinical to enhance critical thinking skills and to accommodate different learning styles. All clinical assignments must be completed with a grade of 75% or higher or they will have to be repeated.

1. Nursing Plan of Care

Varies

The purpose of this assignment is to conduct assessments of adults in the acute hospital setting. For each day you are on the floor in the hospital, you will complete a database, care plan, pathophysiology concept map on one diagnosis on your client and include the following instruments: Braden Scale, and Fall Risk Scale. These assessments will determine the psychosocial, cognitive, and physiological status of your adult clients. This assignment will also enhance the student's communication with adult clients and provide the opportunity to apply principles in clinical situations. The completed plan of care will be submitted in Drop box on eCollege by 2359, the day following your clinical day.

You are required to go to the hospital to pre-plan the day before your scheduled day on the floor at the hospital. The assignment and rubric are posted on eCollege. You need to have the client information, medications for a 12 hour shift, labs, and only one nursing diagnosis when you come to clinical. The assignment and rubric are posted on eCollege. The clinical day at the hospital will be 0630-1700.

During your clinical experiences, you are required to have a client with a medical diagnosis from each of the following categories. It does NOT have to be their primary diagnosis. This diagnosis will be the one that you complete your pathophysiology concept map client specific on for the week.

One from the each of the following categories:

- UTI/ARF/CRF/BPH
- Cancer/Arthritis/Acute Fracture
- HTN/HF/Peripheral Vascular Disease
- COPD/PNA
- Cholecystitis/GERD/C Diff Colitis
- CVA/Parkinson's/Dementia
- o DM

2. Perioperative Assessment

Varies

During the clinical rotation, you will spend one (1) day in the perioperative setting. You are to complete the perioperative assessment on one (1) client **65 years of age or older**. The completed assessment is to be submitted in Drop box on eCollege by 2359, the day following your clinical day.

3. Confusion Assessment Method (CAM) and Mini-Cog Varies NLT 2359 March 31st

During your clinical rotation, you are required to complete the CAM and the Mini-Cog on one (1) of your older adult (65 years of age or older) clients who can communicate with you verbally. Completion requires assessment of your client, documentation on the assessment forms and evaluation of the results. These assessments to be submitted in the separate from the nursing care plan to the assigned Drop box on eCollege NLT 2359, the day following the assessment.

4. Grocery Shopping Experience

Varies

You are scheduled a clinical date to role play the scenario of an older adult going grocery shopping. The purpose of this assignment is to provide students an opportunity to experience older adulthood in performing a common activity. The journal is a maximum of two (2) pages in APA format, not including the reference page and table and is due at 2359, the day after the assignment on the clinical schedule. A title page is not required.

5. Simulation Day/Simulation Day Reflection Journal

Post-operative Simulation 1/30, 1/31

End of Life Simulation 2/22

The student will be exposed to a client in the simulation scenario to improve their familiarity and comfort with varying client situations. The Post-operative simulation is informative. The End of Life simulation will be evaluated as pass/fail for each individual student. In addition, the student will reflect on their experience during the simulation day by completing the simulation effectiveness tool and completing a narrative nursing note. The simulation effectiveness tool is posted on eCollege. Circle your responses to the questions and **in the comment area reflect on your experience.** Also, complete nursing documentation, one page narrative of the client assessment findings and events during the simulation. It is due by 2359 **on the day of your simulation** experience and is to be submitted on eCollege.

6. Skills Day

Cr/NC

On your assigned day, you will be required to attend a lab at the nursing department and perform the assigned skill. You will be checked off on the skills at your clinical site: basic wound care. The skills will be completed on January 24th.

7. Group Presentation

Cr/NC

The group presentation will involve utilizing clinical resources to formulate the project.

8. Medications

100 %

Varies

- 1. Medications of any type are not allowed to be administered until you are assigned by your clinical instructor. Do **not** administer any medications without your instructor. When you administer medications with the instructor, you will not be allowed to give Intravenous Push (IVP), no PRN, and no narcotics.
- 2. A medication calculation 10-question quiz will be given the first week of the semester in class. You must receive a 100 % on the quiz to be assigned to administer medications with your instructor. Anyone not receiving 100% on the medication calculation quiz will not be assigned to give medication. You will be placed on mandatory remediation.
- 3. Remediation will be every week or every other week for 30 minutes with the clinical faculty.
- 4. Each of the seven (7) assigned quizzes will include 2-5 medication calculation questions. If someone is on remediation and receives 100% on the medication calculation questions included on the quiz, they will no longer have to complete remediation. The clinical faculty will be notified when the student may be assigned to administer medications with your instructor.
- 5. If a student does not receive 100% on the medication calculation questions on the final quiz of the semester in the course, they will be on remediation in the following semester. Students will have to complete a medication calculation quiz in the final semester at 100% to complete remediation.

9. Clinical/Facility Evaluation Cr/NC End of semester

You must submit a clinical evaluation, facility evaluation, and instructor evaluation before the last day of class.

You will be evaluated by your clinical instructor at the end of the semester. The overall evaluation of your clinical performance must be satisfactory. You must pass the clinical evaluation to pass the course regardless of the rest of your clinical grade. The clinical component is PASS/FAIL and must be passed in order to pass the course. To receive a passing grade in clinical you must achieve at least 75% on the clinical assignments, receive a satisfactory clinical evaluation, and complete the online facility evaluation.
