COURSE DESCRIPTION Catalog Description:

A general survey course on American minority groups with particular emphasis on racial minorities and ethnic relations. The interplay of these groups in the social cultural, economic, and political development of the United States will be examined. Examples of racial-ethnic groups in other cultures will be compared.

## Course Objectives and Student Learning Outcomes

- 1] To become familiar with the ideas, concepts, theories, and issues commonly associated with discourse on racial and ethnic relations in the United States.
- 2] To consider American minority groups in a comparative and global perspective by examining race and ethnicity in other nations.
- 3) To understand how American economic and political systems and policies shaped and were shaped by racial and ethnic groups.
- 4) To review the impact of racial and ethnic minorities on American culture and cultural institutions in areas such as education, religion, cultural values, family life, business and government.

# **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

Online class only. Weekly discussion questions. **Instructions and grading rubric for course** project paper will be located in doc sharing, separate from syllabus.

### Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

Each student should engage in weekly discussions, more than one day. Discussion post and 2 responses to two fellow students. Utilize student lounge for student discussion to assist one another. The only ignorant question is one not asked. If I don't know the answer, I will research and find the answer and we will seek answers together. You should expect to study one physical hour for each course hour you take, minimal!

#### **IMPORTANT NOTES:**

- 1) Students must cite in-text using APA style, example in doc sharing. Cite and resources graded per example of APA style.
- 2) Late assignments receive a 10% deduction in points, and cannot be accepted beyond one week of the original due date.
- 3) Discussions cannot be re-done or re-graded.
- 4) All discussions and project papers are subject to Turnitin review. Students who plagiarize will receive a zero on the assignment in question. Second attempt to plagiarize, student will be submitted to the Deans office.

## **GRADING**

Grades will be based on two exams; Exam 1 is the midterm; Exam 2 is the final (100 points ea. =200pts); project paper (100pts.); 12 discussion questions (10 pts per question =100 total pts., drop two **lowest grades**); attendance/participation (6pts per class period =90pts, 10pts free).
