# **COURSE OBJECTIVES**<sup>1</sup>:

- to demonstrate the effective application of interdisciplinary scholarship and its theoretical underpinnings through designing and carrying out an independent research project.
- to demonstrate the academic skill of researching a topic from multiple disciplinary fields and to then use the findings to inform one's project.
- to generate and effectively communicate scholarly material which is informed by critical thought and the student's personal academic career.
- to communally engage in the process of assessment, critique, and refinement as applied to the work of not only the student, but of their classmates as well.

# **REQUIRED TEXTS**

There are no required texts. However, students will access, read, and integrate scholarly sources into their final projects.
