COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional Methods, Activities, and Assessments

Instructional Methods

The plan is to run this class as a seminar class. By this I mean that I do not view my role as that of lecturer. Rather, the plan is to be a facilitator of discussion and analysis. The rationale for this format is the following: I do not believe that this is the type of information that you benefit from through memorization. Although behavioral science focuses (more often than not) on normative behaviors, what is important in this class are the experiences unique to you. Thus, I don't really care what the concerns are of a typical college student – I want to know what you are worried about. Thus, I need to hear your voice.

Assignments

Class Participation and Attendance

As you read above, this course relies upon your participation. Thus, a portion of your grade will rely upon your participation in discussions. There are numerous elements that go into class participation: (1) Good attendance (according to University rules, students may be dropped from the class for excessive unexcused absences). If you miss a class, you will lose 10 points toward this grade; (2) Frequent, and preferably intelligent, contributions to class discussion; (3) Active participation in group exercises; (4) Polite and civil interactions with all members of the class ["All students enrolled at the University shall follow the tenets of common decency and acceptable behavior conducive to a positive learning environment." (See Student's Guide Handbook, Policies and Procedures, Conduct)]. Points: 125

Event Paper

All students will be required to attend at least 3 university/campus activities/events and write a critical thinking paper comparing and contrasting the events. Explain how attending the events contributes to your being a more successful college student. If you were advertising for A&M-Commerce, how would you market this experience to prospective or current students? At least one event should be attended with a group of HC/RSP classmates. The events should be a "cultural event" (art show, concert, play, etc.,), a "university-wide event" (guest speaker, colloquium, convocation, etc.), and an athletic event (varsity sport or intramural sport). Only one of each type may be attended; please do not turn in a paper for multiple athletic events or cultural events. *Neither Orientation nor the HC Carnival can count for this assignment*. At the end of the semester, the best paper from all sections will be featured as a post on our Honors College/Regents Scholars public Facebook pages. Students may submit papers at any time prior to the due date. Please place your section on your paper. Points: 75 points total (Due week of Oct. 22)

To-Do List

Most freshmen college students struggle with time management, working on assignments a few days before the due date rather than structuring their homework schedule at the beginning of a semester. Thus, we suggest that all students keep a weekly (or daily) to-do list. Your assignment is to turn in your to-do list for the week of September 18th, showcasing the strategies you've learned from your Mentor House discussion. Indicate which items you completed and which you did not. On a separate sheet, discuss the reasons for failing to achieve some of your goals and what you could do to increase the likelihood of completing them in the future. "I will try harder" is not a satisfactory answer – think about concrete improvements that you can make to your time management skills. Please place your section on your paper. Points: 50 (Due week of Sept. 17)

Plagiarism Certificate

Plagiarism is a serious offense with lasting consequences. You will visit https://www.indiana.edu/~istd/ for a tutorial on "How to Recognize Plagiarism". Visit each section on the left hand side, including IU Definition, Overview, Cases, Examples, and Practice. Once you feel you have mastered the material, take the Certification Test. Your age group is "I'm an undergraduate college student or advanced high school student". You will need to register an account to take the test, using a valid email address. When you pass the test, your certificate will be emailed to you. Forward the email to your instructor before your class time on the due date. Points: 75 (Due week of Oct. 1)

Plant Assignment

You will be given a seed and soil on the first day of class, as well as instructions on how to care for it. The assignment is to take it home and see what happens. Toward the end of the semester, you will submit a one-page reflection of your experience of the process. Was it difficult to take care of your plant? Did it grow? Did you find yourself forgetting about it, or did you look forward to it each day? What did you take away from this assignment? How can you relate it to your academic career? Points: 25 (Due week of Nov. 5)

Resume

Construct a 1-page resume and a cover letter in response to a job posting found in a newspaper or online (include job posting with your assignment). You will also be required to update/create a LinkedIn Profile and ePortfolio. Please place your section on your paper. Points: 75 (Due Dec. 3)

Grading

A total of 425 points is available this semester. Final grades are based on the total number of points earned during the term in accordance, generally, with the following levels of proficiency:
