Course Description:

A survey of the fields of theatre activity designed to provide introductory knowledge of phases of drama, literature, performance, theatre facilities and equipment, and production procedures.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional / Methods / Activities Assessments:

Production Paper (2 @ 10 pts = 20 pts.): Students will write a two 2 page papers (no more, no less) of one of the plays discussed in class: *A Midsummer Night's Dream* by William Shakespeare, *The Caucasian Chalk Circle* by Bertolt Brecht, or *Peter and the Starcatcher* by Rick Elise. The paper must include a brief summary of the play following the linear plot forms discussed in class as well as the student's opinion on the play. **Please remember play titles are in italics.** Punctuation, spelling, and sentence structure will count in the grading. Papers are to be printed out and hand delivered to the instructor.

Performance Critique Paper (1 @ 10 pts = 10 pts): Students are required to attend a performance of at least one of the TAMUC Playhouse productions. Students will submit a paper on their opinion of the production as well as apply concepts discussed in class. Papers should be approx. 1 page, typed, double-spaced, and 12 pt. font. Punctuation, spelling, and sentence structure will count in the grading. Papers are to be printed out and hand delivered to the instructor or submitted via email to: jfoster21@leomail.tamuc.edu.

Quizzes (2 @ 10 pts = 20 pts): Two quizzes will be given during the semester covering topics previously discussed in class. There will be 4 open ended questions per quiz.

Tests (**Tests 1 & 2** @ **15 pts. each** = **30 pts**) Two tests will be given during the semester covering topics previously discussed in class.

Final (1 @ 20 pts. = 20 pts): Students will work in groups of no more than 8 and select a play at random. Group of students will provide brief presentation over a play listed at the end of this syllabus as well as a play research paper. Presentation can be in a handout, PowerPoint, or a poster board collage. Presentations will be delivered by hand or emailed to the instructor at: jfoster21@leomail.tamuc.edu no later than the last day of class.

COURSE AND UNIVERSITY PROCEDURES/POLITIES

Course Specific Procedures:

Attendance Policy:

You may accumulate five (5) absences before any penalty occurs. After your fifth unexcused absence a half of letter grade will be deducted from your final grade. If you become sick, have an injury, or if a family emergency arises email the instructor ASAP.

Late Arrivals:

PLAY RESEARCH FORM Group #3

Play: The Baltimore Waltz.

Playwright: Paula Vogel

Genre: Serio-Comedy

Year: 1992

List of Characters: Anna, Carl, Doctor

Setting: Hospital room in Baltimore, Maryland and various locations in Europe

Play Summary: When Anna, an unmarried schoolteacher, is diagnosed with ATD, Acquired Toilet Disease, a fatal new malady with a high risk factor for the elementary school teachers, she and her brother Carl take flight to Europe. Anna decides she wants to down herself in the sensuality of food and sex, while Carl becomes involved in a while Third Mannish espionage scheme to find a cure for his sister on the Continent. Their European adventure is broken by Carl's death, and the tragic revelation that the entire play was Anna's valiant fantasy to keep alive her brother's spirit when she could not save his life.

Student Opinion: Our group enjoyed reading *The Baltimore Waltz* by Paula Vogel! We were all blown away by the ending when we found the entire production took place in Anna's imagination while she waiting for her in the ER for her brother. We all got emotional when we found out Carl was dead the entire time and Anna was using this trip to cope with her brother passing of HIV. Elements we found humorous in *The Baltimore Waltz* was the quick wit and cunning brought on by Anna and The Third Man in the bedroom during Scene 13! The part we most enjoyed was when Anna and Carl first got to Paris, France and Anna had to stuff her face with as much food as she could while still trying to maintain her composure. Our favorite character was The Third Man because his part consisted of 16 other roles!

Creating the Space: Our group envisioned the production being done with minimal set and props. 4 boxes, 2 columns, and a white sheet that will be used to show projections throughout Anna and Carl's various locations in Europe. Costume pieces would be contemporary. Actors would make a dance for each scene transition. Amanda had the idea of when Carl's dead body is revealed following his and Anna's waltz, the Doctor would take down the projector sheet and cover Carl's body.
