

## COURSE DESCRIPTION

This semester we will study how to win audiences through discussion and writing with an informed opinion on contemporary design issues. The class will read current and relevant articles, essays and books on design disciplines, design pedagogy and teaching todays design student. These readings will inform required written responses and discussions. Reading, researching, analyzing and writing will provide a deeper understanding of design topics and an awareness of how writing is used within the discipline of graphic design. Writing with confidence is an ongoing learning process. It takes practice, more practice and patience. The more you write, the more confident you will become. Group discussion of topics and issues are also a facet of the class. These moderated conversations will encourage you to learn from each other, share ideas, and formulate opinions and arguments in real-time. Group discussion may vary from week-to-week.
