LIBS 497 -Faith and Reason

Learning Objectives

This course will provide experiences for students to work on (1) enhancing reading skills by carefully considering primary text materials, (2) engage in intensive writing by writing weekly seminar questions, mid-term and final (3) participate in high-level discussion through explication of text, critical questions, and peer discussion.

Course Description: In this course, we examine the perennial question of political and religious life: How should I live my life? We employ two main, and alternative, perspectives of the Western Judeo-Christian tradition: the philosopher and believer. Throughout the semester, we will examine the question of how to live life by reading philosophical and religious texts that cover core themes, such as Socratic wisdom, the life, and teachings of Jesus, love, friendship, and death.

Class Attendance and Participation: Participation includes coming prepared to each class by having done the reading assigned for each week, participating in class, and listening attentively to your classmates. Absences and lateness will lower your final grade. Legitimate excuses only include **emergencies** of a medical nature and circumstances that we deem appropriate. Absence policy: three unexcused absences drop in letter grade; five unexcused absences, leads to second drop in letter grade. If a student reaches seven unexcused absences, then, we will remove you from the course. You must come to class on time. After a two minute grace period, you are officially late. Three late class arrivals equal one absence.

Each week you must write 2 critical questions that address key problems in the readings, one due Monday and one on Wednesday. The content of the questions must always be ahead of the content of our class discussions. Questions should show an effort to explore an important or puzzling question about the meaning of the assigned text, be comprehensive, yet, precise. These assignments are a core component of your participation grade; however, we will not grade your seminar questions. Instead, we will offer you substantive comments, which will serve to help you improve your reading and writing. The weekly seminar questions will be collated and serve as a portfolio for an assessment of your grade at the end of the semester.

Reading Schedule: Unlike most of your courses, this is a co-taught class that asks you to read from core texts and interdisciplinary perspectives. As such, we, the instructors, have decided not use a fixed reading schedule. Instead we are going to move organically, taking the proper care to address the themes at hand. Some themes will require more time than others, and we will move on to the next theme once the class as a whole has reached an adequate level of understanding.

Below is a template of the themes we are going to address and some of text and readings for those themes, with the caveat, each week we may tinker with the reading schedule. We never seek to overburden you, but as the course progresses we desire that the themes from the philosophical and theological perspectives coalesce into a greater whole.
