Course Description:

A survey of the underlying ideas, principles, and participatory practices of constitutional government in the United States and Texas. Topics considered include civil liberties, and civil rights, constitutionalism, federalism, ideology, pluralism, political culture, and socialization, political parties, interest groups, public opinion, republicanism, voting and the electoral process, and global forces that continue to shape our understanding of the relationship between the people and the government. Please note that you will not be taught what to think about political issues in this course, rather you will be provided with the knowledge to determine how to think about political issues for yourself. This course is meant to provide you with working knowledge how a government functions both at the federal and state levels in the United States and Texas.

1. Understand and employ significant theoretical and analytical approaches to explain the political institutions and policy development and implementation of the government of the United States.

Format:

Each class session will consist of and involve lectures and discussion over the assigned readings and any other supplemental readings the instructor wishes to add. You will regularly be asked to contribute your opinions and answer questions about the readings.

<u>*Participation:*</u> With this being an online course, you will need to login to D2L and access this course regularly throughout the week. There will be discussion board posts weekly and assignments throughout the semester that you will be required to complete on our online platform. Not logging in and keeping up with due dates and weekly readings and assignments will have a detrimental effect on your grade.

Exams: There will be three exams given during the semester in addition to a final exam to be administered during finals week. They comprise a significant portion of your grade so, it would be beneficial to be prepared for your exams. **Exams will open Thursday at 8:00 pm** and **close Friday of the same week at 8:00 pm**. Since there is a twenty-four window for exams makeup exams will not be given unless under dire circumstances. If you have an athletic or academic reason as to why you are not able to take the exam during the window it is open you must email me IMMEDIATLEY so that other arrangements can be made.

Book Review: This review will be over a book outside of the assigned readings, you are not required to purchase the book if you can find it in the library system. You may select your own book, but it will have to be approved by me. The book review will be over non-partisan political issues, and can include the biography/autobiography of political leaders. This is to help develop

your writing skills, and allow you to look at how other people have discussed topics that are at the forefront of our political lives. The book review should be in TIMES NEW ROMAN with 12 point font and one inch margins all the way around with a cover sheet. The book review will be due to the dropbox with an attachment to be sent to Turnitin on D2L. **BOOK REVIEWS WILL NOT BE GRADED IF THEY ARE SUBMITTED LATE. NO EXCEPTIONS.** Further instructions will be provided at a later date.

<u>Quizzes:</u> Quizzes will be given weekly and can be over the subject matter or current topics/events. Questions for the quizzes will come from the week's lectures, assigned readings, and any breaking news (political, sports, or pop culture related). Quizzes will be given randomly during the semester, so again it is imperative that you log into the course regularly throughout the week and cannot be made up if they are missed. When quizzes are given during a week they will open on Tuesday at 8 am and close that same day at 10 pm.

Discussion Board Posts: Like with a face to face class where students would engage with one another, you will be expected to do so in this course as well. For weekly discussion posts students are expected to respond to the week's prompt with a MINIMUM of at 350 words and you are also responsible for responding to at least THREE other classmates' responses with a minimum of at least 150 words per response. Original discussion posts are due Thursday of each week by 11 pm and peer responses are due Friday of each week by 11 pm. Late responses or original responses will not be accepted or graded. You should make four total posts each week discussions are posted each weeks' discussions are worth a total of 20 points totaling 220 points for the semester. In your discussion posts please include a word count. *Extra Credit:* Extra credit will be given at the instructor's discretion. I will NOT create extra credit for any student at any time because they "need to get" a certain grade. I do not "give" grades rather you EARN your grade.

<u>Submitting Assignments & Late Assignments</u>: Assignments (book review) without cover pages and/or no name will not be graded. I <u>DO NOT</u> accept late work. Each assignment is given with enough time to complete it. Assignments that have to be submitted to the dropbox are **ALWAYS** due at 8 pm the day they are due. **Assignments submitted online after 8 pm will not be opened or graded.** You are responsible for attaching the correct assignment to the correct folder in D2L Brightspace. Once you submit your assignment you should always click on the document, or no document is counted as failure to complete the assignment on time.
