Course overview:

Practical Shakespeare is designed to develop the students understanding and training of the challenges of performing Shakespeare. This is a performance-based class where we will explore the works of William Shakespeare through the art and craft of acting. We will explore several monologues and scenes from his plays over the semester. The main focus of the class will be focused on making the words come alive in our bodies, minds and our imaginations. We will also explore the clues that are present in the dialogue that will help the speaker tap into the emotion of the scene. Students will investigate several different "on their feet" exercises; paraphrasing, script analysis, in class discussions, vocal and physical work. These exercises are geared toward getting the character off the page and into the students' body and mind.

Course objectives:

- Provide students with acting methods that enhance and engage the text
- To improve the student's levels of performance skills
- To not feel intimidated but liberated by Shakespeare's language
- To create a learning environment where students can make bold and fierce acting choices

Student learning outcomes:

Students will:

- Understand the basics of Shakespeare's language: blank verse, iambic pentameter
- Ask critical questions about the characters and script
- Understanding why the characters are using these words at this precise moment
- Be collaboratively creative with their fellow students
- Breakdown of scenes and scripts through analysis of given circumstances, objectives, beats, etc.

Assignments:

Scansion work: 25

Breaking down and putting back together monologues and scenes. This will be presented as acting exercises as well as written work.

Monologue work: 25 points

Each student will be given a Shakespearean monologue to rehearse and present along with the necessary scansion/analysis work.

Final Scene & Analysis: 50 points

A scene will be assigned, rehearsed and presented as the final exam. Appropriate scansion work, character/scene analysis will be due at the time of the final presentation.

5. Any recurrences of disruptive behavior on the part of the student cited would result in expulsion from the class and a grade of "F" recorded in the semester in which the offense occurred.
