COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

A broad interdisciplinary course in the historical development of the United States and North America to 1877. Note: Assignments will focus on reading, writing, and analysis. Pre/co-requisite Eng. 1301or 1302.

Course purpose

This course is intended to familiarize you with significant events and themes in the history of the United States to Reconstruction. You should complete this course with a very basic understanding of many of the shaping factors of the social and political cultures of the United States.

Student Learning Outcomes:

1. Critical Thinking - Students will be able to analyze, evaluate, or solve problems when given a set of circumstances, data, texts, or art.

- 2. Communication In written, oral, and/or visual communication, A&M-Commerce students will communicate in a manner appropriate to the audience and occasion, with an evident message and organizational structure.
- 3. Personal Responsibility Students will understand and practice academic honesty.
- 4. Social Responsibility Students will demonstrate an understanding of societal and/or civic issues.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional / Methods / Activities Assessments

This will be primarily a lecture and readings course. The lecture will provide the evidence you need for creating evidence-based answers to the essay questions on the exams. A list of all the potential essay questions for the semester will be made available on the class site for the course during the second week of class. You will need to prepare in advance to be ready to write a coherent, well supported essay during a timed exam. You will also take a number of online quizzes over lecture material, outside readings, and assigned podcasts.

GRADING

Grade structure:

This course will include two in-class essay exams and online quizzes

- Multiple Choice Quizzes: These quizzes will be taken on online. Each will be available for one week minimum, with the exception of the lecture quiz in the last week of class. Quiz due dates are listed on the calendar below. There are 4 reading quizzes and 2 lecture quizzes. There is also a Responsibility Quiz.
- Exams: These will be one essay. You must be able to write a coherent, well structured essay that adequately addresses the question.

Make-ups:

Make-ups for the first midterm exam will be arranged on a per case basis. However, you must complete it by noon one week after the original exam date. This means you must contact me ASAP to arrange a make-up. I don't want an excuse, just let me you know missed it (do not tell me why) and ASK for a makeup. I will only be on campus MWF, so your opportunities for make-up times are extremely limited. It is best if you contact me the day of the missed exam. Make-ups may be a different format at my discretion. There are NO makeups for missing an online assignment due date, nor are there after-the-fact makeups for the final exam.

Course Specific Procedures

Attendance

Attending class benefits you. I will track attendance for record-keeping purposes. I will not lower your grade for not attending, but poor attendance does result in poor test scores.

Academic Honesty and Dishonesty

You are expected to do your own work. Dishonesty will not be treated lightly. On each graded assignment I expect each student to honor the following pledge: "I hereby give my word that I have neither given nor received aid while completing this assignment." Any student found violating this policy will receive a grade of zero for the assignment, and further action my be taken.

Plagiarism:

Plagiarism is taking someone else's work and passing it off as your own words, thoughts, or ideas. This includes, but is not limited to, using direct quotes out of a book or from the internet as your own words, properly using quotation marks but noting the wrong person as the author, purchasing a paper or exam from friends or strangers, using material from the internet verbatim as your own words, and cutting and pasting entire papers or internet pages and passing it off as your own work. Cheating on exams and discussion posts or allowing others to copy your answers is another form of academic dishonesty.

It is may be acceptable to use other people's words and ideas as long as they receive credit in citations. If you are unsure about the precise definition of plagiarism and/or think you may have committed this form of academic dishonesty, see the instructor or visit the Online Writing Lab before you turn in the assignment.

Cell-phones, Laptops, Pagers, etc

I recommend and ask that students not use laptop computers for taking notes. Do not use your laptop for any other purpose during class, as it distracts those around you. All cell-phones and pagers must be turned off or set to silent during class. Do not check or use cell-phones or pagers during class, unless given express permission by the instructor. Disrupting class by using one of these devices will get you an invitation to leave for the remainder of class; this includes texting. If you aren't going to be mentally present in class, you can do that more efficiently from a different physical location.

On exam day, you may not use laptops and should turn off pagers and phones before entering the room. If a pager or phone goes off during the exam, wait for me to come to you before turning it off. Anyone using one of these electronic devices during an exam will automatically receive a grade of zero and be asked to leave the exam room.

I do not usually give extra credit. Do not ask; that will lower the possibility.
