Quiroga's stories, together with vocabulary and grammar review, are available in *Cuentos y lengua*, provided to students in both an online and hardcopy version.

Course Description

Spanish 2311, Intermediate Spanish II, finishes the four-semester sequence which begins with a student's first course in Spanish. In this final semester, students read selected short stories of Horacio Quiroga. These stories have been chosen for their intrinsic cultural, linguistic, and literary merit, and offer universally interesting themes presented in accessible Spanish prose. Vocabulary exercises and a grammar review all use language from the stories.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students will learn to read, answer questions about, and discuss Spanish prose written for a general audience.
- 2. Students will improve their written Spanish through assignments related to the themes suggested in Quiroga's short stories.
- 3. Students will improve their spoken Spanish through class discussions.
- 4. Students' hold on Spanish grammar will improve through targeted reviews and practice of perennially difficult topics.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Facility with accessing the course learning management system and its features, using Microsoft Word.

Instructional Methods

This course meets once weekly in seminar format; discussions, led by the instructor and special presentations at least once during the term by each student.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

As with all university study, success in this course will come as a result of sustained preparation for and participation in class meetings.

Final grades in this course will be based on the following scale:

• All work must be submitted by the due date. Special circumstances may arise, but any late submission must have prior approval of the instructor.

Assessments

The student's performance in the following areas will determine the student's grade for this course:

• Weekly response and class participation: Students must come to class, readings or written work or grammar exercises complete. An active participation in classwork ensures an optimal learning environment for all. (20% of course grade.)

 \cdot **Chapter tests, the stories and grammar:** A short test will follow the conclusion of each of the seven chapters. (50% of course grade)

• **Final examination:** Given in accordance with University policy at the prescribed time and place. Instructor will provide a detailed guide for preparation of the final examination: which stories or topics and which of the grammar reviews. (30% of course grade).

Student Grievance Procedure

Students who have concerns regarding their courses should first address those concerns with the assigned instructor in order to reach a resolution.
