COURSE SYLLABUS

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course focuses on three-dimensional material, technical, practical, conceptual and creative problem solving problem with attention to material choice, construction, installation, technical ability and advancement. Art history, the relationship, interaction and importance of surface, structure, space, movement and color, realism and abstraction, and the power of metaphor will be discussed and explored.

Students will complete a variety of projects that utilize different materials, construction techniques and goals. A range of contemporary works and artists will be incorporated into class discussions.

Increased attention will be given to the conceptual and aesthetic issues involved with three-dimensional sculptural materials as a **fine art medium** to create formally and conceptually expressive objects that are knowledgeable, sophisticated, and resolved.

CATALOGUE DESCRIPTION:

ART 1312 – Three-Dimensional Design & Color Theory

Hours: 3

An exploration of the fundamental elements and organizing principles of three-dimensional design and its integration of color and color theory.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Demonstrate increased ability, knowledge and awareness in the following areas:

- To gain technical and problem solving skills as they apply to creating objects and installations.
- To advance visual, physical and conceptual problem solving abilities.
- To understand how sculpture is utilized in a variety of disciplines.
- To understand the importance of craftsmanship and installation strategies, while learning how formal decisions impact the meaning of the work.
- To understand that art functions as a vehicle for meaning and expression, with the possibility of initiating introspection, conversation, awareness and change.
- To encourage creative and ambitious thought processes and work habits.
- To introduce a variety of contemporary artists whose works relates to the current assignments.
- To become comfortable and confident when talking about art during discussion and critiques.
- To understand how to articulate physical details about art works, and how these formal decisions, details, and the use of metaphor, successfully (and/or unsuccessfully) work to communicate emotional affect, and/or cultural awareness.
- To understand that art is an important and necessary vehicle, to creatively initiate critical thought, discussion, introspection and change.

MINIMAL TECHNICAL SKILLS NEEDED:

Students will need to be proficient in Microsoft Word and PowerPoint, and ideally in Adobe Photoshop (for documentation purposes). Website management (Chrome, Firefox, Blogger, Word-press) will also be discussed for an online presence.

EXPECTATIONS:

- 1. Working outside of class is required but is not a substitute for in-class work and participation. Access to the Sculpture studio at night and on weekends will be through monitored lab hours as there is no ID swipecard.
- 2. Timely completion of required work by the critique dates is required.
- 3. Criticism and discussion are important aspects of artistic activity and development. Attendance and active, thoughtful verbal participation at all critiques is mandatory.
- 4. Students are expected to engage in personal research in the university library where there is an extensive collection of books on sculpture as well as periodicals. Many other resources are available online and in Metroplex museum collections.
- 5. Students are expected to attend all exhibitions in The University Gallery as well as other events hosted by the Department of Art such as visiting lecturers and visiting artist workshops.

POSITIVE SOCIAL WORK ENVIRONMENT:

In addition to being responsible for the proper use of facilities and equipment, all students are responsible for maintaining a positive social work environment. Advanced students are expected to model good studio practice to students in the beginning classes. A baseline expectation is that all students will be civil and cooperative in their dealings with other students. The necessity of sharing workspace and equipment requires that cooperation take place. A positive sense of community will foster productivity and the creation of good work.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES OR TIPS FOR SUCCESS IN THE COURSE:

Three-D Design & Color Theory will meet on Tuesday & Thursday, from 6pm-8:50pm each week. We will have a total of 30 meeting periods throughout the academic semester and a final culmination meeting during finals week. Though the course only meets for a total of almost 6 hours each week, you will be expected to do at least double that outside of class on the required presentations and preparing revised artist statements. Your studio artwork will be self-directed and should also be thoroughly considered and prioritized.

GRADING FORMAT:

A = 100 – 90: Excellent work, work meets the requirements and goes above and beyond expectations.

- B = 89 80: Work meets all requirements to a high degree, and is presented in a meaningful fashion.
- C = 79 70: Work is average, meets all requirements minimally, presentation is "satisfactory."
- D = 69 60: Work is below average, concepts are missing or not fulfilled, presentation lacks quality.
- F = 59 50: "F" Work receives a failing grade, unacceptable and insufficient work.

ASSESSMENTS: *Please refer to D2L for revised ONLINE syllabi assessments and assignments*

Your grade will result from an evaluation of the following criteria: projects / assignments, participation in group critiques, presentations, professional practices. Attendance will be considered into your grade; <u>after four absences</u> <u>the resulting grade will be a failure of the course.</u>

- The finished work must show evidence of an understanding of the technical, aesthetic, and conceptual aspects of the assigned projects
- The degree of effort and involvement apparent in the work
- The degree of innovativeness and creativity shown in the work
- The quality of technique (craftsmanship), emphasizing improvement over the course of the semester

A midterm evaluation will be based on the body of work completed by Midterm. The final, semester grade will be based on the following:

- 70 % Personal artworks created throughout and group discussion / critiques
- $10\ensuremath{\,\%}$ Presentations, materials of Artist selection
- 10 % Gallery Essay(s)
- 05 % Professional attitude and Work Environment

Remember that your final grade will be subject to the attendance policy stated above

Extra credit is given for volunteering as a student monitor in The University Gallery, first floor, room 103, in the Art Building. For extra credit to impact your final grade, a minimum of five hours must be logged as a volunteer. There is a sign up sheet in the Art Office room 104.


