#### **Course Description:**

Provides an in-depth analysis of prevalent issues to higher education institutions. Emphasis is placed on addressing or resolving the effects of these issues on the total institution.

#### **Student Learning Outcomes:**

Students will understand the context, challenges, and complexities of the American higher education system; and apply ideas for possible resolutions for institutional sustainability, improvements, and continued progress.

# **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

#### **Instructional / Methods / Activities Assessments**

Readings in the course textbook as assigned and in supplementary resources as necessary.

Mandatory participation is required in online threaded discussions (see course modules in e-college) over each course module. No late discussion posts will be accepted/graded. This represents 20% of your grade.

Participation in online threaded discussion over each research/reading assignment. (Note—no late participation will be accepted. IMPORTANT--relying solely on the lectures and the text for your threaded discussion posts will be considered average work and will be graded accordingly. In addition, please remember to cite all references appropriately, quoting any use of exact wording of authors and adhering to APA and university standards. Deviation from these standards will also result in a reduced grade. Initial responses to the discussion questions are due by Wednesday of each week. Responses to at least 2 of your peers are due by the Saturday of each week. No partial credit/points will be given. Both the initial response and responses to your peers must be completed and completed by the due date to receive credit. Both components: 1) the initial discussion question and responses to peers and 2) initial response and responses to the peers, must be completed for credit/points. Failure to complete one or more components will result in no points/credit being given.

Personal reading logs of each selected reading chapter is required (see course modules in e-college). Write a two-page summary (approximately 500 words) for each selected reading chapter. Each chapter log should be separate – in other words – you cannot put 2 chapters in one reading log. Each chapter must be separate. Post your summary into the appropriate location in dropbox. When posting make sure that you post under the correct module and assignment number. **This represents 30% of your grade.** 

A total of 6 critical analysis five-page papers are due in this course. The papers are intended to serve as demonstration of your in-depth content knowledge, conceptual understanding of the relationship among multiple variables of an issue or context, and ability to apply ideas and plausible resolutions for institutional sustainability, improvement, or progress. Post your summary into the appropriate location in dropbox. When posting make sure that you post under the correct module and assignment. **This represents 50% of your grade.**
