# **Course Description:**

Provides the student with an overview of the fashion and architecture associated with various time periods and regions. Familiarizes students with the terminology of fashion and architecture. Emphasis of this course will be on what key components and trademarks of different eras and regions in order to be a more effective and knowledgeable designer.

# **Learning Outcomes:**

- Recognize and utilize design terminology, as it applies to fashion and architecture.
- Identify key aspects to major design styles of design eras.
- Be able to research the visual aspects of different eras.
- Recognize the influence of fashion and architecture on each other.

- Write critically using analytical thinking and research shills about visual history (Graduate)
- Explain the intricacies and complexities of how fashion and architecture are influenced by the social history of an era (Graduate)

#### Assessment:

- 1. Following each unit there will test covering the vocabulary and styles of the eras discussed.
- 2. There will be a take-home exam over Spring Break that will serve as the midterm. The midterm will test on everything covered in class to that point.
- 3. The final exam will be cumulative and will take place during the scheduled exam time.
- 4a. Production response papers will be due the first class following the close of each required production. Students are required to evaluate and respond to the designs of each show using the information covered in lectures (650 word minimum, typed, double-spaced, 12 pt. font). Students are also required to participate in class discussions regarding design responses.

  4b. Anyone taking this course for graduate credit will need to write two 2,000-3,000 word papers. The papers need to demonstrate skill in research and analytical writing. One will be due March 6<sup>th</sup> and the other May 1<sup>st</sup>. Paper Topic A Explain how the social history of a time caused the shift in the look of one era to the next and how within this new era the fashion influenced the architecture or vice versa. Paper Topic B Choose an era that is a revival of an earlier era and described what prompted the revival of that style and describe the differences between the original and the revival. The papers can be done in any order as long as they are both done. These papers should be appropriately formatted and cited with a bibliography and combination of print and online sources (3-5 sources). Please see me with any questions.

A grade of "A" will not be assigned to any individual who has not completed ALL outside of class assignments. (Final, Attendance at departmental productions) regardless of average.
