Editorial Porrúa has a very serviceable, one volume edition, but unfortunately without Martín de Riquer's notes.

Course Description

Cervantes y *Don Quijote:* a close reading of Cervantes's great work, studied in the historical, aesthetic, literary, and linguistic contexts which make the work both comprehensible and magnificent.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1.Students will hone their communication skills through writing activities and a presentation.
- 2.Students will demonstrate an understanding of the aesthetic, sociohistoric, and other contexts relevant to a discussion of the *Quijote*.
- 3. Students will demonstrate their understanding of this first novel by reading with care and reflection this seventeenth-century Spanish text.
- Students will demonstrate that they are active and engaged members of a learning community as measured by the quality and frequency of responses in regular course discussions.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Facility with accessing the course learning management system and its features, using Microsoft Word.

Instructional Methods

This course meets once weekly in seminar format; discussions, led by the instructor and special presentations at least once during the term by each student.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

Students should read each week's assignment with care, in addition to any document posted in the LMS. Success in the course will require sustained engagement of Cervantes's text.

GRADING

Final grades in this course will be based on the following scale:

A = 90%-100% B = 80%-89% C = 70%-79% D = 60%-69% F = 59% or Below

• No extra-credit work will be assigned.

• All work must be submitted by the due date. Special circumstances may arise, but any late submission must have prior approval of the instructor.

Assessments

The student's performance in the following areas will determine the student's grade for this course:

• Weekly response and class participation: This course consists of a careful reading of Cervantes's masterpiece, weekly selections chosen with a specific thematic focus for each class. Students must arrive each week having read the assignment, together with a short paragraph to record a reaction/response/comment. These weekly written responses will form a journal for the course. (40% of grade)

• **Midterm test:** The midterm test will include questions drawn from class discussion of the readings. The instructor will provide a clear indication of what topic(s) students should prepare for this test. (30% of course grade)

• **Final examination:** Given in accordance with University policy at the prescribed time and place. Questions will come from a very explicit outline the instructor will provide to guide preparation for this test. (30% of course grade).

Because your active participation in discussions is essential for your own learning and the learning of others, attendance is vital for success in this course. Students must complete all assignments on time, stay current with the readings, and engage in discussions each week. Although differing views and debates among class members are encouraged, I expect all students to treat other class members with respect and courtesy. Rudeness and insulting remarks will not be tolerated. Please be considerate of all other members of this class.

Student Grievance Procedure
