Course description:

In this course we will concentrate our attention on reading, Aristotle's Nicomachean Ethics by taking a casual and leisurely approach in our reading and discussion of the text.

Learning objectives: This course will provide experiences for students to work on (1) close reading and enhancement of reading skills by carefully considering primary text materials, (2) engage in intensive writing exercises by writing short explications of texts, providing peer-to-peer feedback, and revising writing assignments, and (3) participate in high-level discussion through explication of text, short in class-writing, and peer discussion.

Reading Assignments: I do not assignment a set amount or pages in the syllabus because we move through the text organically. Each class session, I will stop to reflect where we are and how far in advance the students should read. Although this course does not have a heavy reading load (in pages) students are expected to read with focus and care. In addition, students take a primary role in class discussion. Be ready to participate and be called upon to answer questions.

Attendance and Class Participation: Your attendance is imperative. This class is a seminar, every week builds to the next. We only meet once a week. Commitment to the schedule is key.

Participation includes coming prepared to each class by having done the reading assigned for each class, talking in class, listening attentively to your classmates, and participating in break out session. Your grade will not just depend on the volume of your participation, as I place equal consideration on the quality of your comments and questions.

At the start of each class, a pair of students will lead class discussion (30 minutes). It is the responsibility of students to introduce some key ideas and raise questions for discussion. It is not the

discussants job to offer the class a summary of what they have read. See handout "Guidelines for Discussants"

Final Project.

The standard final project for a seminar is a final paper, 12-15 pages. Yet, for this class you have a choice. You can conceive an alternate final project. You can approach the project from any number of directions. No matter what subject you choose, you must show a serious engagement with the primary source material. And, most importantly, your project needs my approval.

Weekly Schedule.

Excluding Spring Break, we will meet every Friday at the scheduled hour in the first floor conference room. We are moving organically through the text and will get as far as we can as a group. As such, I am not assigning weekly material.
