COURSE INFORMATION

COURSE DESCRIPTION

An introduction to financial accounting concepts and financial reporting, with the focus being on how decision makers analyze, interpret, and use accounting information. Emphasis is given to how accounting measures, records, and reports economic activities for corporations and on the relationship between accrual and cash flow measures in interpreting accounting information. Prerequisite: Completion or concurrent enrollment in MIS 128 or CSci 126.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, the student will:


- 1. Apply the fundamental concepts and assumptions that underlie financial accounting principles.
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of the steps of the accounting cycle and of the basic elements of the four financial statements.
- 3. Identify, record, and report transactions in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles.

Repetition is how this material is learned. The assignments will force repetition and therefore, assist in absorbing the material. Although many of the issues

included in the readings will be covered in the class lectures, all the areas covered in the readings will not be part of class presentation. You are encouraged to participate in class and communicate with the other students in the course. The nature of this course encourages an interactive forum, and everyone has something valuable to contribute.

ASSESSMENTS

Accounting is a very challenging topic and requires much practice. The weekly assignments due on the schedule below are key parts of this course and critical to your success. These assignments are open book and are to be completed on MyLab.

Pre-Class Quizzes (Mid-Week Assessment)

There will be pre-class quizzes in every chapter worth 10 points each. The purpose of the pre-class quizzes is to help pace your study according to the class schedule. These quizzes are due by <u>end-of-day **Wednesday** each week</u> with a duration of 30 minutes and **two** attempts. The lowest pre-quiz grade will be dropped.

Homework

Read and outline the chapter before attempting homework. Homework assignments are worth 30 points each. The purpose of the graded homework is to practice concepts at a higher level of difficulty than the pre-class quizzes. Assignments are due by **9:00pm** on **Sunday** of that week. They have no time limit and **two** attempts. The lowest homework grade will be dropped.

Post Quiz

There will be 12 post quizzes worth 10 points each. The purpose of these quizzes is to give you feedback as to how much material you retained and mastered in preparation for the closed-book midterm and final exams. These post quizzes are due on **Sunday** at midnight with a duration of 30 minutes and one attempt. The lowest post-quiz grade will be dropped.

Exams

This section of the course requires three (3) regular exams and a final exam worth 150 points each. Each exam is due <u>every **Monday** at midnight</u>. See the Course Calendar for a detailed breakdown of the exam dates.

Make-up exams will be considered only under extenuating circumstances. The following are considered extenuating circumstances: hospitalization, medical emergency, physical injury or death of an immediate family member. You will be **required to provide** proof of the extenuating circumstance in order to be approved for a make-up exam. Make-up exams will be scheduled within three days of approval.
