**Spa 497.01W** es un curso intensivo de nivel de pregrado que se presenta online. Por favor lea con atención los requisitos técnicos en el apéndice E de este programa.

**Descripción y objetivos generales del curso**

A través de un acercamiento interdisciplinario, vamos a examinar en este curso diferentes aspectos de varios periodos de la literatura, el arte y la cultura hispana y latina. Examinando algunos textos desde diferentes perspectivas, sobre todo aspectos sociales, leeremos trabajos de autores literarios representativos además de un número de artefactos artísticos y culturales que reflejan la cultura político-social de épocas determinadas; por ello, estudiamos las obras literarias y artísticas desde su inscripción en contextos políticos y socio culturales de las épocas en las que fueron creadas. Un objetivo importante del curso es explorar la enseñanza de la literatura y cultura hispanas a los estudiantes de secundaria que toman el curso AP (Advanced Placement), incluyendo recursos digitales y multimedia.

**Objetivos y competencias**

Las siguientes competencias serán enfatizadas durante el curso:

- Capacidad de análisis y síntesis
- Capacidad para organizar y planificar
- Habilidades para recuperar y analizar información desde diferentes fuentes
- Resolución de problemas
- Capacidad de crítica y autocrítica
- Capacidad para aplicar la teoría a la práctica
- Habilidad para trabajar de forma autónoma

**Student Learning Outcomes**

Students will demonstrate the ability to construct a lesson plan that integrates a variety of artistic texts through the use of audiovisual and digital technologies, for the teaching of literary/cultural units. Students will follow the recommendations of the College Board with respect to Spanish Literature and Culture Advanced Placement exam. A rubric will be used to measure the different competencies required for the lesson design.

## **Materiales y textos**

## **Formato del curso y de las clases**

Nuestra semana laboral comienza el lunes a las 12:00 a.m. (medianoche) y termina el viernes a las 11:30 p.m. De acuerdo con ello, todas las actividades, tareas, etc., programadas para cada Módulo, deben ser entregadas para el viernes antes de las 11:30 p.m. Puede trabajar a su propio paso, pero sepa que para cada módulo tendrá que participar en un foro de discusión para compartir información y entregar un plan de lecciones diseñado por usted. Tanto la discusión, como el plan de lecciones se deben entregar para el viernes antes de las 11:30 p.m.

### Explicación de las actividades

#### Plan de lecciones

Además de hacer todas las lecturas designadas para cada Módulo, los estudiantes trabajarán en la construcción de un plan de lecciones que se relaciona con una obra elegida de la lista de lecturas AP. Al final del curso el estudiante habrá construido tres planes de lecciones correspondientes a tres de los géneros literarios mayores: la narrativa, la poesía y el drama. Cada plan de lección deberá ser entregado en “Activities” y “Assignments” de D2L Brightspace, a partir del Módulo 2, antes de las 11:30 p.m. del viernes.

#### Ensayo/Participación en foro para compartir

Cada estudiante contribuirá al foro de discusión con una idea original sobre un tema distribuido por la profesora – Instrucciones se encuentran en D2L, bajo “Instrucciones y guías”.

#### Ensayo Final

El ensayo final consiste en una comparación de dos obras artísticas, una debe ser de literatura (de la lista de lecturas AP) y la otra obra debe pertenecer otra expresión artística que no sea literatura (pintura, escultura, arquitectura, etc.). Las instrucciones para este ensayo se encuentran en D2L bajo “Instrucciones y Guías” – El ensayo final debe ser entregado el día 2 de julio, antes de las 11:30 p.m. en D2L – “Activities” – “Assignments” – Ensayo final.

APÉNDICE A  
Policy #12

ACADEMIC HONESTY

Preamble. Students at Texas A&M University-Commerce are expected to maintain high standards of integrity and honesty in all their scholastic work. Faculty members are expected to employ teaching practices that encourage academic honesty.

1. Academic Dishonesty Defined. Texas A&M University-Commerce defines “academic dishonesty” in the following way (Procedure A13.12 “Academic Honesty”): Academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, plagiarism (the appropriation or stealing of the ideas or words of another and passing them off as one's own), cheating on exams or other course assignments, collusion (the unauthorized collaboration with others in preparing course assignments), and abuse (destruction, defacing, or removal) of resource material.

2. “Plagiarism” Further Specified. The Department of Literature and Languages builds on the university

definition of “plagiarism,” given in 1, in the following manner (taken from “Defining and Avoiding Plagiarism: The Council of Writing Program Administrators’ Statement on Best Practices” undated, pages 1-2, 12,2003. <http://www.ilstu.edu/~ddhesse/wpa/positions/WPAplagiarism.pdf>)

Plagiarism occurs when a writer deliberately uses someone else’s language, ideas, or other original (not common-knowledge) material without acknowledging its source. [. . .] Ethical writers make every effort to acknowledge sources fully and appropriately in accordance with the contexts and genres of their writing. A student who attempts (even if clumsily) to identify and credit his or her source, but who misuses a specific citation format or incorrectly uses quotation marks or other forms of identifying material taken from other sources, has not plagiarized. Instead, such a student should be considered to have failed to cite and document sources appropriately.

3. “Collusion” Further Specified. Collusion specifically includes selling academic products. According to the Texas Penal Code (*Title 7 Offenses Against Property*, Chapter 32 Fraud, § 32.50 Deceptive

Preparation and Marketing of Academic Product), an “academic product” means a term paper, thesis, dissertation, essay, report, recording, work of art, or other written, recorded, pictorial, or artistic product or material submitted or intended to be submitted by a person to satisfy an academic requirement of the person.”

The Texas Penal Code also specifies that person commits a Class C misdemeanor offense “if, with intent to make a profit, the person prepares, sells, offers or advertises for sale, or delivers to another

person an academic product when the person knows, or should reasonably have known, that a person intends to submit or use the academic product to satisfy an academic requirement of a person other than the person who prepared the product.”

4. Responsibility. Matters of academic dishonesty are handled initially by the instructor. If the instructor feels the problem warrants more attention, it should then be pursued through the department head. If the department head and instructor wish, it should be brought to the attention of the Dean of the college for study and review before being referred to the University Discipline Committee (adapted from Texas A&M University-Commerce Procedure A13.04, “Plagiarism”).

Instructors may also Choose to refer cases directly to the University Discipline Committee (Texas A&M University-Commerce Code of Student Conduct 6.a[2]).

5. Statement for Course Outlines. Instructors of record in the Department of Literature and Languages are required to include an Academic Honesty statement in all course outlines. The following language is suggested for that statement:

*Instructors in the Department of Literature and Languages do not tolerate plagiarism and other forms of academic dishonesty. Instructors uphold and support the highest academic standards, and students are expected to do likewise. Penalties for students guilty of academic dishonesty include disciplinary probation, suspension, and expulsion. (Texas A&M University-Commerce Code of Student Conduct 5.b[1,2,3])*

6. This Policy supersedes Department of Literature and Languages Policy #12, “Plagiarism,” dated October 10, 1990, and will be effective until further notice.

7. The Head of the Department of Literature and Languages is responsible for maintaining this policy current.

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## **APÉNDICE B**

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### **Internship and State Exam Requirements Department of Literature and Languages SPANISH**

Students who are seeking to earn certification to teach Spanish need to know that the Department of Literature and Languages is responsible for permitting students to enter internship and to take the required state exams. Approval to take state certification examinations is based on admission to do an internship. Without departmental and College of Education approval to do an internship, students will not be permitted to take the certification exams in Spanish.

To earn certification in Spanish, the LOTE (Languages Other Than English) exam must be taken. Students must meet departmental requirements for internship before they will be able to sit for the certification examinations.

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## **APÉNDICE C - Student Grievance Procedure**

Students who have concerns regarding their courses should first address those concerns with the assigned instructor in order to reach a resolution. Students who are unsatisfied with the outcome of that conversation or have not been able to meet individually with their instructor, whether in-person, by email, by telephone, or by another communication medium, should then schedule an appointment with the Department Head or Assistant Department Head by completing a Student Grievance Form (available in the main office, HL 141). In the event that the instructor is the Department Head, the student should schedule a meeting with the Dean of the College of Arts, Sciences, and Humanities after following the steps outlined above; if the instructor is the Assistant Department Head, students should schedule a meeting with the Department Head. Where applicable, students should also consult University Procedure 13.99.99.R0.05 (“Student Appeal of Instructor Evaluation”).
