HHPK 1306.001

First Aid and Safety – 3-semester hour credit Summer I – 2020 (TBA / Online Instruction)

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Catalog Description:

This course is designed to develop the knowledge and skills necessary to be effective as a first responder to accidents, injuries, and sudden illness. Life-saving skills and accident prevention principles will also be included.

Course Objectives: The student will.....

- 1. Develop the knowledge and skills needed to meet many different types of situations when emergency first aid care is needed and medical assistance is not excessively delayed.
- 2. Develop the knowledge and skills needed to aid the infant, the child, or the adult who is experiencing a breathing emergency.
- 3. Develop knowledge and skill in the use of the AED (Automated External Defibrillator).
- 4. Develop knowledge and understanding of the many causes of accidents and injuries so that action can be taken to eliminate or minimize such causes.

Class Procedures:

Due to the current pandemic (CoVid-19), HHPK 1306.01W will be taught completely online during the summer 1, 2020. For some classes, this will be more difficult than for other courses that you may take this summer. In First Aid and Safety, all lectures/power point presentations will be downloaded in the YouSeeU-Virstual Classroom on the D2L System and made available for you to review at your leisure. A schedule of the date/time for each live/virtual power point presentation is listed on the course calendar just in case you have time and would like to join me (joining in on the live presentation is not mandatory and has no effect on your grade in the class). However, by joining in on the live presentations, you will be able to ask questions in "real time" and get a much faster response to your questions.

Each student enrolled in the class will be provided with materials for practicing bandaging and splitting skills as well as manikins (infant and adult) that may be used to practice CPR and other breathing emergencies. At the time that you receive your items, instructions will be given that need to be followed to help clean and maintain your equipment. <u>Please note: I will communicate</u> with each of you to set up a date/time that your equipment will be delivered as well as returned.

Assignments:

Reading: The textbook is required for the course. To help facilitate class discussions, it is absolutely necessary that class readings be read – and read on time. In order to be proficient as well as efficient, it is imperative that students practice the first aid and CPR skills that will be taught in the course.

Exams:

There will be four exams equally spaced throughout the semester. The exams will not be comprehensive and will only cover material from the respective chapters during the semester. The exams may include multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions that cover content from the class lectures and readings. The fourth exam will be held on the last class day.

To review for the scheduled exams, it is recommended that students complete the test review sections at the end of each chapter. No "make-up" exams are available unless due to extenuating circumstances (i.e. death of an immediate family member, severe illness/illness, etc.) and the student has <u>written approval</u> from the instructor to take the exam at a later date.

Academic Honesty

At all times students are expected to complete work independently unless instructed to do otherwise (e.g. the group presentation). Ideas and writings from others should be properly referenced. If you are not sure how to do this, it is your responsibility to learn how by consulting APA guidelines or the instructor. Cheating on exams is definitely forbidden. The use of textbooks and notes (unless permission is given by the instructor) or soliciting help from fellow students during an exam is not allowed. Instances of plagiarism, cheating, or other forms of dishonesty that are discovered will result in a failing grade on the given assignment for all involved students. More severe cases will be referred to the Head of the Department and may result in a failing grade for the course.
