Readings – Readings will be made available at least one week prior to the deadlines of the reading reflection assignments.

Course Description

This course covers computational physics from a variety of perspectives. The course will include computational methods and advanced wave content. The course will also include history of the subject incorporation into physics curriculum, current events in computational physics, and physics education research relevant to waves and computational physics will be discussed.

Note that the advanced waves content requires calculus, differential equations, and vector calculus.

University Catalogue Description

The syllabus/schedule are subject to change.

The basics of Python programming will be introduced. Different methods of integration, derivations, solving differential equations, plotting and use of libraries will be introduced in the context of advanced waves topics.

Wave topics in harmonic oscillatory physical systems such as Mass-Spring will be explored. The physical properties of a traveling wave through a medium will be explored. Modern topics such as Chaotic systems will be introduced. Use of Spreadsheets as a supplementary method to programming to study evolution of different physical systems will be introduced. Emphasis will be placed on programming and conceptual understanding.

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Students will be able to use computational techniques in Python and Spreadsheets to interpret different quantities of physical systems in the context of waves.
2. Students will be able to apply numerical methods in Python to calculate integrals, derivatives and solve differential equations.
3. Students will be able to discuss the application of findings of physics education research to their own classrooms.
4. Students will be able to incorporate history and current events in physics into their own teaching.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Students should be able to use myLeo Online, view videos on YouTube, and use scanners and pdf combiners.

Instructional Methods

Each week, a video will be uploaded about the week's computational wave content. There will be points during each video during which you should pause and work the sample problems before continuing to watch the video. A discussion board can be found under each week for you to discuss working these problems and your homework problems. A document will be uploaded introducing each reading assignment and containing prompts for your reading reflection. A discussion board can be found under each week for you to discuss the reading assignment. Problem set homework and reading reflection homework will be due approximately every other week. See the schedule at the end of the syllabus. There will be 1 midterm exam and a final project covering the advanced computational wave content.

The syllabus/schedule are subject to change.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

Students are expected to watch the videos, participate in all discussions, complete all homework assignments, and complete all exams. Students are to be aware of all deadlines and ask questions when directions are unclear.

Assessments

Grades will be based on 5 components:

- 35% Exams (midterm exam and final project)
- 20% Problem set homework
- 15% Reading reflection homework
- 15% Problem discussion
- 15% Reading discussion

Midterm Exam and Final Project: There will be 1 midterm and a final project. They will be weighted equally, so each is worth 17.5% of your overall grade. See exam due dates at the end of the syllabus. The midterm exam will be made available one week before the due date. The midterm exam has a 5 hour time limit. It is your responsibility to set aside a time when you can complete the exam and follow the time limit. Midterm exam will be closed book, but you may use a 2-sided 8.5"x11" crib sheet. A document will be uploaded containing suggestions for such references. You will complete midterm exam on your own paper and then scan them and submit them to myLeo Online as a single pdf document with the pages in order and properly oriented. You do not need to submit your crib sheets with your exam. The instructions for the final project will become available in the middle of the semester.

Problem set homework: Problem sets will be assigned approximately every other week. See the schedule at the end of the syllabus. Problem sets will be made available no later than one week before the due date. Assignments will be graded 70% for effort and

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30% for correctness. For example, if you fully attempted each problem but every answer was incorrect, you would receive a grade of 70. You will complete problem sets on your own paper and then scan them and submit them to myLeo Online as a single pdf document with the pages in order and properly oriented. Problem Sets should be submitted as a single file. Do NOT upload several jpg files. **Do NOT upload a PDF file larger than 10 MB in size.** You are strongly encouraged to discuss your problem set homework with fellow classmates on the class discussion boards. Problem set solutions will be made available less than 72 hours after the deadline.

Reading reflection homework: Reading assignments will be due approximately every other week. See the schedule at the end of the syllabus. Each reading assignment will be an article about history, current events, or physics education research. You will write a reading reflection based on the assigned prompts. A document will be made available containing the rubric for how reading reflection homework will be graded. You should submit your reading reflection as either a Word document or a pdf document through the myLeo Online.

Problem discussion: You are expected to participate in the problem discussions either to discuss the sample problems or to discuss the problem set homework. A document called Problem Discussion Rubric will be made available so that you understand how you will be graded for your participation in this discussion. Problem discussions will open on Wednesdays and close on the following Wednesday. You must make your first post in the problem discussion forum no later than the Monday listed as the due date in myLeo Online at noon.

Reading discussion: You are expected to participate in discussions about the reading assignments. A document called Reading Discussion Rubric will be made available so that you understand how you will be graded for your participation in this discussion. Reading discussions will open on the Wednesdays when reading reflection homeworks are due and will close on the following Wednesday. You must make your first post in the reading discussion forum no later than the Monday listed as the due date in myLeo Online at noon, and you must write at least three posts total. At least two of these posts should be responses to other students' posts.
