Course Description

This course provides a survey of the fields of theatre, designed to provide an introductory knowledge of the phases of drama, performance, literature, and production procedures. This course, and all its components, will be web-based.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students will learn fundamental principles, vocabulary, and theories of Western theatre.
- 2. Students will develop creative capacities through online exercises and discussions.
- 3. Students will learn to critically apply course materials to live performances.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Students are required to login to D2L weekly in order to complete assigned discussions, quizzes, and other assignments.
- 2. Students are required to attend two productions via the Department of Theatre at TAMUC.
- 3. Students are required to watch a filmed performance of a play or musical outside of the Department of Theatre.

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

- 1. Students must be able to navigate D2L via MyLeo.
- 2. Students must be able to use a word processing software (Microsoft Word, Google Docs, etc.) as well as presentation software (Power Point, Prezi, etc.). 3. Students must be able to check their email regularly.

Instructional Methods

- Attendance: Students must participate in all weekly assignments in order to
 <u>receive credit for participation for that week. These will include:</u> a. Group
 Discussions, Quizzes, Movie Assignments, etc.
 - i. These will be based on the assigned chapter each week.b. Individual assignments

The syllabus/schedule are subject to change.

- i. The assignments will consist of you choosing a movie from the assigned list and completing the assignment correlating with the previous weeks chapter.
- c. FINAL PROJECT This will be discussed further closer to the due date.

Your final project will be <u>a recorded performance of a monologue or scene</u> of your choosing accompanied by <u>written script work</u>.

- A monologue must be between 1-3 minutes long.
- A scene must be 3-5 minutes long and you must be the main character. (You may perform with a person from your family/home that you live with, and they can be on or off screen.)

You do not have to memorize your monologue/scene, but please know that it is encouraged and if you choose to memorize your piece you will receive extra credit!

- 2. Play Attendance: All students are required to see two plays at TAMUC this semester. Productions will be presented online, for a price of \$5 each. Ticketing information will be provided via D2L. Students must provide proof of attendance with the following:
 - a. A copy of your ticket receipt (screenshot or email)
 - b. A screenshot of the production as you view it on your computer, iPad, phone, etc.
- 4. Late work will be accepted at the discretion of the instructor, and only with appropriate documentation. YOU MUST EMAIL ME FOR APPROVAL! 5. Extra credit may be provided at the discretion of the instructor and will be announced via D2L.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

1. Students are encouraged to login multiple times per week in order to participate fully in group discussion, check for updated information, and stay in contact with the instructor and fellow students.

- 2. Students are encouraged to participate earlier in the week, in order to better facilitate discussions and to avoid potential issues (such as problems with technology, internet issues, etc.).
- 3. Students should ensure they have stable, working internet connections in order to fully participate in this web-based class.
