Course Description

This is a graduate readings course in the Old South (i.e. the Southern United States prior to Reconstruction) Students will become familiar with a variety of secondary literature on the region and period, through reading, writing reports, presentation, and discussion.

Student Learning Outcomes (Should be measurable; observable; use action verbs)

1. Students will become familiar with major aspects of the historiography and history of the Old South.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Use of a web-browser to access the internet. Use of a word processor such as Microsoft Word to create documents.

Instructional Methods

This class will meet via Zoom on a weekly basis. Students will do independent reading and write reviews in preparation for course discussions. There will be some lecture component, but class meetings will mostly be guided discussion.

GRADING

Final grades in this course will be based on the following scale:

Students will read 9 books. You will write a book review of 2 book and reports on 7 books.

Book Reviews: You are required to write 2 book reviews for the course, over the common books. Each review should follow the formatting and style of the template book review that will be provided, be typed **double**-spaced with 1-inch margins, free of grammatical and spelling errors, provide correct citation where necessary, include discussion of a published academic review of the assigned book, and should be no less than 3 full pages & absolutely no more than 5 pages. Furthermore, each weekday a paper is late without a documented excuse I will deduct 10% off its earned grade.

Book Reports: You are required to write 7 book reviews for the course, over your individual book choices. Reports are not reviews. Reports should include the following:

- 1. List the author, title, press, original publication date (and reprint if appropriate) using the standard bibliographic entry as a review would.
- 2. Summarize the overall scope and content of the book.
- 3. State & discuss the thesis (or theses) and relate it to other relevant historical interpretation you are already familiar with (or become familiar with in the course of this class).

The syllabus/schedule are subject to change.

- 4. Evaluate the thesis and documentation of the work.
- 5. Cite two published book reviews in academic journals. Name the reviewer, their affiliation at the time, and journal citation for the review.
- 6. Include a brief paragraph of information on the author. Try to find out some biographical information (date/place of birth for example), list the date and institution of their highest degree held, other major publications, institutional affiliation presently (or at time of publication, or retirement or death).

You will provide copies of these reports to every student in the class and the instructor. For **SIX** (6) of these reports, you will present in-class. You will have 20 minutes to elaborate and expand on the written report. You may choose to elaborate on themes already touched in the written report, or additional themes not contained in the written report. Do not just rehash what is in the written report. Following the oral presentation, expect to answer questions from other students and guide discussion of the book in your report. All students are also expected to formulate questions and further discussion on books they are not reporting on.

Books selected for a written report must be approximately 300 pages. Books significantly shorter will not count as a single report and will need to be supplemented by another short book or lengthy article. Books over 600 pages will count as two reports. We will begin choosing books during the first class meeting (if you really want to present in week 2, we can discuss choices before the first class meeting).

Each report should be typed **single-**spaced with 1-inch margins, free of grammatical and spelling errors, provide correct citation where necessary, include discussion of a published academic review of the assigned book, and should be no less than 3 full pages & absolutely no more than 5 pages. Furthermore, each weekday a paper is late without a documented excuse I will deduct 10% off its earned grade.

Book Reviews, each (x2): 10% (20 points)
Participation: 20% (20 points)
