Course Description:

This course provides an overview of federal income tax laws and regulations. The course emphasizes the impact of federal income tax on the individual taxpayer.

Examinations

Three exams will be given during the semester. The exams will cover specific chapters as we cover the material during the semester. The exams will be similar to the homework and problems assigned in class. There are **no** make-ups for the two exams. If you plan to miss an exam due to extenuating circumstances you must notify the professor prior to the exam to set up a time/date to take the exam.

Weekly live sessions will be offered using Zoom to go over important concepts and review problems related to various chapters. Please read the chapter prior to attending the class live session so that you may benefit from the lecture and be able to ask questions on the material being discussed.
