## **Course Description**

This course provides the paralegal student with a basic and thorough understanding of laws governing the creation and operation of businesses. Topics covered include the formation of business entities (including sole proprietorships, partnerships, corporations, and other business structures), corporate filings, minute book preparation, ethical obligations of the paralegal working in this field, and computer applications being utilized in corporate law practice. Practical skills are emphasized through assigned drafting and formation projects.

## **Course Objectives**

The goal of this course is to enable the student to:

- Understand and apply general business law concepts;
- Draft simple contracts
- Understand common business structures, including corporations, partnerships, etc.
- Understand and be able to identify legal issues involved in lease agreements
- Understand basic concepts of intellectual property law

## **Attendance Policy**

Attendance is required and roll will be taken at every class. It is vital to attend each class as we only meet once per week. <u>Unless you are granted an exception for a particular class period, you will only be considered to have attended class if you are present during the live online presentation.</u>

## **Grading Policy**

You are also responsible for completing assignments. Your assignments will be reviewed, graded and returned to you. This is a cumulative grade over the course of the semester. Weekly assignments cover the material who have just finished learning about in class and are <u>due at the beginning of next class meeting</u>.

All assignments must have a cover page indicating the following: your name, class, name of the assignment, and date the assignment is due.

All written work will be graded not only on content, but also on writing style, **including punctuation and grammar**. You must speak with me if you plan to turn in work late but wish for it to be graded. Depending on the circumstances, I may or may not grade late work.

You will be required to submit a legal memorandum during finals week. This is the culmination of the work you will be doing in this class and it must be a solo project. Any two or more memos that appear to be the result of collaboration will be met with skepticism and a potential failing grade.

# What is Plagiarism

Many people think of plagiarism as copying another's work, or borrowing someone else's original ideas. But terms like "copying" and "borrowing" can disguise the seriousness of the offense:

According to the Merriam-Webster Online Dictionary, to "plagiarize" means:

- 1. to steal and pass off (the ideas or words of another) as one's own
- 2. to use (another's production) without crediting the source
- 3. to commit literary theft
- 4. to present as new and original an idea or product derived from an existing source.

In other words, plagiarism is an act of fraud. It involves both stealing someone else's work and lying about it afterward.

## But can words and ideas really be stolen?

According to U.S. law, the answer is yes. The expression of original ideas is considered intellectual property, and is protected by copyright laws, just like original inventions. Almost all forms of expression fall under copyright protection as long as they are recorded in some way (such as a book or a computer file).

## All of the following are considered plagiarism:

- turning in someone else's work as your own
- copying words or ideas from someone else without giving credit
- failing to put a quotation in quotation marks
- giving incorrect information about the source of a quotation
- changing words but copying the sentence structure of a source without giving credit
- copying so many words or ideas from a source that it makes up the majority of your

work, whether you give credit or not (see our section on "fair use" rules)

Most cases of plagiarism can be avoided, however, by citing sources. Simply acknowledging that certain material has been borrowed, and providing your audience with the information necessary to find that source, is usually enough to prevent plagiarism. If you have retained the essential idea of an original source, and have not cited it, then no matter how drastically you may have altered its context or presentation, you have still plagiarized. If you plagiarize, you will receive an F for the assignment in question and the matter will be referred to the Office of the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.
