Welcome to Introduction to Music Literature

Welcome to the course. Music is a part of our daily lives, and it can trigger some of our most treasured memories. As a part of our daily lives, we can choose what we listen to, but we are also exposed to a great variety of music in stores, during movies and television, or bleeding through someone's headphones among many other examples. The scope, variety, and depth of musical cultures around the world is astounding, and ripe for exploration. In this course, we will address a variety of musics to examine music's role in culture: how it both shapes and is shaped by social, political, national, and cultural forces. Examples from Western art music, popular music, and world music will be used to demonstrate music's inextricable link to life in both historical and contemporary settings. No prior or concurrent courses are required for enrollment in this course, nor is any prior musical training or experience.

Course Description

This course has three main modules, further broken-down week-to-week; it addresses a variety of musics to examine music's role in culture. We will examine how music both shapes and is shaped by social, political, national, and cultural forces.

This course provides an understanding of music from the Middle Ages to the present including jazz, contemporary, and world musics through a topical approach. There will be an emphasis on basic musical materials, principles of musical design, as well as music's relation to culture. This course is for students not planning to major in music; no previous musical training is required.

The objectives of this course are to:

- Present ways of listening to and thinking about music from a variety of time periods, genres, and cultures.
- Promote cultural understanding through musical knowledge.
- Reveal music's relationship to the individual and to the human condition.
- Encourage self-reflection and critical thinking.

Online Course - No Assigned Meeting Times:

• This course is 100% online and does not have any scheduled meeting times. There will be weekly opportunities for "live" office hours via Zoom. The course requires regular access to the internet to access course materials, assignments, meeting links, and other materials.

- Musical Terminology: Students will be able to demonstrate a broad vocabulary of musical terms, accurately when describing the elements of music such as rhythm, pitch, meter, harmony, and texture.
- **Cultural Engagement**: Students will be able to interpret and analyze cultural topics relevant to the music, artists, concerts, and audiences of musical selections.
- **Critical thinking**: Students will be able to analyze, evaluate, or solve problems when given a set of circumstances, data, texts or art.
- **Communication**: In written, oral and/or visual communication, students will communicate in a manner appropriate to audience and occasion, with an evident message and organizational structure.
- **Social responsibility**: Students will demonstrate an understanding of societal and/or civic issues

Descriptions of Major Assignments and Examinations

Assignment and Grading Break Down

<u>Quizzes (20%)</u>: Throughout this course, you will have regular, short quizzes, to build up vocabulary and key concepts. They can include multiple choice, short answer, or audio examples.

<u>Discussion Forum Posts/Responses (20%)</u>: An integral part of this course is interacting with your classmates. You will have weekly discussion board prompts to answer and subsequently comment on or critique posts by two other group members. Details provided in the assignment page.

<u>Assignments (30%)</u>: These assignments further students' your engagement with the music and different cultural contexts in written, audio, or video formats. They will utilize research, writing, presentation, and critical thinking skills. Students will learn research resources available through the library, as well as different presentation methods effective in an online setting.

<u>Listening Journal (30%)</u>: The goal of listening journals is two-fold, to build on listening habits and practices the student already has, but also to expand and grow active listening skills. Each assignment will build upon skills, terminology, cultural context, and critical thinking skills examined in the chapter and module. Individual assignment instructions will be provided on D2L.

Grading: Grading Rubrics and Assignment Expectations will be provided on the course website.

*all assignments will be submitted in our course website; we will use Turnitin software to check for plagiarism.

A note on **Extra Credit**: the instructor reserves the right to assign, or not assign extra credit. Extra credit work, however, is not a way to "make-up" for work not submitted. Extra credit adds a boost when all of the normal work for credit has been turned in.
