Course Description:

From the course catalog: This course is intended to provide students an overview of the field of clinical psychology. Students will be exposed to information regarding the history of the science, as well as contemporary clinical psychology. Students will also be introduced to the various assessment and psychotherapeutic strategies used by clinical psychologists in their daily practice. By the end of the course, students will have an indepth understanding of the range of assessment and psychotherapeutic services that clinical psychologists provide to patients of all ages across multiple settings. Prerequisites: PSY 2301.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Define the professional of clinical psychology and distinguish it from other mental health care professions.
- 2. Discuss the importance of using an evidence-base for provision of mental health services.
- 3. Describe the types of activities clinical psychologist perform and the guiding principles used in practice.
- 4. Discuss the training of clinical psychologist and relevant licensures they can earn.
- 5. Describe the current diagnostic system and common concerns raised out this system's limitations.

- 6. Summarize the purpose of psychological assessment and describe the strengths and weaknesses of various strategies clinical psychologists may employ.
- 7. Describe the principles of psychotherapeutic interventions, various theories associated with these interventions, and specific evidence-based interventions for children and adults.

Discuss the various subfields of clinical psychology, including clinical neuropsychology, clinical forensic psychology, and clinical health psychology.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Course Format: This is a fully online course through D2L learning management system with online meeting times, required readings, powerpoints, and various assignments.

Course Assignments:

- I. Quizzes- Quizzes will be assigned over each chapter of the required reading in order to assess retained knowledge. These quizzes will be taken closed book, closed notes, without another person helping, and with no internet aid. You should retrieve the required information from your memory. There will be fifteen quizzes administered. However, if you complete all fifteen, I will award you full credit for your quiz with the lowest score. Quizzes are worth 13.5% of your grade. We will review quiz answers in class.
- II. Article Summaries There will be four article summaries due throughout the semester. These summaries will be good practice for graduate school and teach you how to read and understand research. These assignments are cumulatively worth 13.5% of your grade.
- III. Midterm The midterm will be a 50 question, multiple choice exam. This is worth 26.5% of your grade.
- **IV. Paper-** Students will complete a 5-7 page paper, excluding cover and references, in APA format. This is worth 20% of your grade.
- V. Final- Format to be determined. This is worth 26.5% of your grade.

In order to succeed in this course, you will need to keep up with all lectures, readings and assignments. If you fall behind it might be difficult to catch up.
