COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Emphasis is placed first on a study of the fundamental principles of understanding and appreciating mental disorder. Then a study of the types of disorders including etiology, cause, symptoms, therapy, and prognosis.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Students will be able to identify the beginnings of Abnormal Behavior in a historical context.
- 2. Students will be able to identify the components of an integrative approach to Psychopathology.
- 3. Students will be able to identify appropriate measures for assessment and diagnosis of psychopathology.
- 4. Students will be able to identify various types of research methods used for psychopathology
- 5. Students will be able to identify specific symptoms related to psychopathology of a variety of diagnosis.
- 6. Students will be able to identify the legal and ethical issues with the mental health laws.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Students will the ability to use word processing programs and internet-based learning management software to complete course successfully.

Instructional Methods

A variety of teaching strategies will be used to help students become familiar with the DSM-5 and the various psychological disorders currently acknowledged by the American Psychiatric Association. These strategies include:

- 1. Instructor class lectures
- 2. In class discussions
- 3. Group case scenarios and diagnostic skill development
- 4. In class quizzes/examinations
- 5. In class assignments
- 6. In class demonstrations of interviews and measures

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

- 1. Attend all classes.
- 2. Read the textbooks and DSM-5.
- 3. Complete assignments thoroughly and on time.
- 4. Take notes.
- 5. Actively participate in class discussions.
- 6. Read DSM-5 and text prior to presentation.

Group Projects (There are 6 Group Projects for a Total of 30%, 5% each)

Group projects will be an integral portion of this class. Each week you will be randomly assigned groupmates to work together on a clinical case. This variation in group distribution will cultivate group dynamics. After a weekly lecture/discussion, the remainder of class time will be spent with your group. Your group assignments will be due by 11:59PM on each Saturday, so use your group time wisely.

Quizzes (There are 6 Quizzes for a Total of 30%, 5% each)

Quizzes will be scattered throughout the semester and are designed to help you become more familiar with the DSM-5 and psychopathology.

Assessment-Midterm (Total 20%)

There will be one midterm exam covering the course content from Weeks 1-7

Assessment-Final Exam (Total 20%)

There will be one final exam covering the course content from Weeks 8-15.
