Course Description

This course focuses on the effect of politics, organizations, and resources on the delivery of high quality, cost-effective health care. The leadership role of the advanced practice nurse in the design, implementation, and management of human fiscal and physical health care resources is emphasized. Prerequisites: Instructor permission.

Student Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, student will be able to:

1. Analyze how policies influence the structure and financing of health care, practice, and health outcomes (AACN Essentials Domain 7).

2. Differentiate and delineate legislative and regulatory processes (AACN Essentials Domain 9).

3. Identify and analyze the effect of health care policy issues on minority populations (AACN Essentials Domains 3 & 9).

4. Evaluate local, state, and national socioeconomic and health policy issues and trends affecting rural and urban communities (AACN Essentials Domains 3 & 7).

5. Explicate the organization of various health care delivery systems (AACN Essentials Domains 3 & 5).

6. Evaluate the leadership role of the advanced practice nurse within health care organizations (AACN Essentials Domains 9 & 10).

7. Synthesize basic principles of fiscal management, budgeting, and health care (AACN Essentials Domain 7).

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Using the learning management system, using Microsoft Word, Microsoft Excel and PowerPoint.

Instructional Methods

This is an online course requiring students to complete reading assignments, online activities and independent study to be successful. Course objectives may be met through individual study using suggested resources, active involvement in class activities, formal, and informal exchange of ideas with classmates and colleagues regarding specific topics as well as utilizing critical thinking skills. Teaching methods include lecture, seminar, discussion, small group work, independent study of texts and library resources, computer-assisted instruction, audio-visual aids, and assignments. While the professor will provide guidance and consultation, the student is responsible for identification of learning needs, self-direction, seeking consultation, and demonstration of course objectives.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

• Logging into the course website and email regularly for faculty communication (especially the night before class/clinical)

- Updating semester calendar with communicated changes
- Regular study (recommend a minimum 2-3 hours study/course credit hour per week). For example 3-credit course = 6 to 9 hours study time/week.
- Attendance at all class meetings, clinical, seminars and simulations
- Review and remediation of examinations.

A minimum grade of 75 is required to pass the course.

Successful completion of the required assignments will enable the student to meet the student learning outcomes.

Late Submissions:

It is expected that you will submit all class and clinical assignments on time. If you need an extension, it should be requested <u>before</u> the due date/time and may or may not be approved at the discretion of the course coordinator. Unexcused late assignments will

be penalized 10% per day for each of the first two days overdue; on the 3rd day, the grade will be assigned as 0%. Communication on these matters is the student's responsibility. Multiple instances of late clinical assignments will result in receipt of a Student Performance and Behaviors Evaluation Form and, possibly, failure of clinical/course.

Paper Submissions:

All documents submitted online are to be in .docx, .rtf, or .pdf format. No other formats will be accepted (JPEG, GIF, etc.). Assignments need to be submitted in a maximum of one document per assignment. Failure to follow these guidelines will result in a grade of "0" on the assignment.

Assessments

Policy Reaction Paper 10% 2/27

The purpose of this learning activity is for the student to explore, evaluate, and to react to selected current information related to advanced practice nursing, and/or health care administration, policy, organization, and financing. Each student will be assigned an appropriate resource for this assignment. The paper should be no more than four (4) pages in length, including the title page and the reference page (all references should be within the past 5 years). The paper will be submitted by 2359 on the due date on D2L. The rubric for evaluation of this paper is provided within this syllabus (Student Learning Outcome #4).

Policy Critique Paper 25% Topic due 2/27; Paper 4/10

The purpose of this learning activity is for the student to critique a health care policy. Each student will complete a paper critiquing the health care policy not to exceed ten (10) pages in length, including the title page and the reference page (all references should be within the past 5 years). For your critique, develop a PICOT question as identified on the provided information later in the syllabus related to your policy. The critique should identify the PICOT question used, the policy's official name, trace its origin-including primary and secondary sponsors in the relevant legislature, current status of the bill/policy, implementation in health care (including any organizations involved in the policy development), and any social media presence. Evaluate its effectiveness, finance/cost considerations, effect on health services (especially focused on minority populations), application to advanced practice nursing/health care administration, and implications for the future. Prior to performing the critique, each student must obtain approval from course instructor for the selected topic. Students are expected to employ self-directed methods to learn and gather information for this activity and are encouraged to use a variety of resources, including reading assignments, library resources, personal observation, practice, and public and private facilities, as appropriate. The paper will be submitted by 2359 on the due date on D2L. The rubric for evaluation of this paper is provided within this syllabus (Student Learning Outcomes #1, #3, and #7).

Policy Critique Presentation 20% week of 4/18 TBD

The purpose of this learning activity is for students to present their policy critiques to the class. The presentation should include information on the policy, its origin and implementation in health care, its effectiveness, finance/cost considerations, effect on health services, application to advanced practice nursing/health care administration, and implications for the future. The presentation should be no longer than 15 slides (all references should be within the past 5 years). The presentation will be submitted by 2359 the day before the presentation on D2L, as well as presented on the assigned date. The rubric for evaluation of the presentation is provided within this syllabus (Student Learning Outcomes #1, #3, and #7).

Legislative Visit and Paper15%3/27

The purpose of this learning activity is to gain a deeper understanding of legislative and regulatory processes and health policy issues and trends at the governmental level. Students will visit the Texas State Capitol in Austin, Texas and speak with elected state representatives and/or their staff members as part of Texas Nurse Practitioners (TNP) Capitol Day. Complete a paper following the visit in which the student will analyze the dynamics of the current Texas legislature, describe a significant proposed bill or policy (excluding the bill that is the major focus of TNP), and identify the bill/policy stakeholders. Examine the proposed effect of the bill/policy on health care delivery and advanced practice nursing in Texas, and describe the feedback received from the legislator or staff. The paper should include a table (see below in syllabus) identifying the student's legislators. The paper should not exceed five (5) pages in length including the title page and the reference page (all references should be within the past 5 years). The paper will be submitted by 2359 on the due date on D2L. The rubric for evaluation is provided within this syllabus (Student Learning Outcomes #2 and #4).

Thank You Letter to a Legislator5%4/3

The purpose of this learning activity is to gain understanding of legislative processes and the health policy advocacy role of the advance practice nurse. Each student will write a thank you note to a specific legislator regarding the visit made to the legislator's office. If a staff member assisted the student during the legislative office visit, the staff member should be mentioned in the letter to the legislator. A copy of the letter and confirmation of receipt by the legislator's office are to be submitted by 2359 on the due date on D2L. Confirmation of receipt can be a screenshot indicating letter was sent (Student Learning Outcomes #2 and #4).

Professional Nursing Organization Membership & Summary 5% 2/6

The purpose of this learning activity is to gain a beginning understanding of the leadership role of the advanced practice nurse as a member of a professional organization. Each student will provide proof of membership in one nursing professional organization <u>other than</u> Texas Nurse Practitioners (TNP). In addition, each student will

write a one-page summary related to the professional activities of the selected professional nursing organization, include any coalitions of which the organization is a member (all references should be within the past 5 years). The paper and proof of membership is to be submitted by 2359 on the due date on D2L. The rubric for evaluation of this activity is provided within this syllabus (Student Learning Outcome #6).

Disaster Preparedness Policy and Procedure 20% 5/9

The purpose of this learning activity is for the student to assume a leadership role in the analysis and critique of a health care delivery system policy. Students will review their employer's disaster preparedness policy and procedure. If the student is not currently employed in an organization that has a policy, the student should search for a policy and procedure online (making sure the source is clearly identified) and use that policy. In addition, each student is to attend at least one of the following disaster preparedness related meetings/events: disaster drill planning meeting for the university nursing department or hospital; disaster preparedness session at the university nursing department or hospital; or disaster drill at the university or hospital. After attendance at the disaster related meeting/event and review of the selected policy, the student will write an evaluation of positive aspects of the policy, how the policy could be improved and any factors that were learned from meeting/event attendance. The paper should be no longer than four (4) pages in length, including the title page and reference page (all references should be within the past 5 years). The paper will be submitted by 2359 on the due date on D2L. The rubric for evaluation is provided within this syllabus (Student Learning Outcomes #5 and #6).
