COURSE DESCRIPTION

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to the field of psychology and to give a general understanding of the basic principles of psychology. Since it is intended to cover a variety of topics within psychology, it provides an overview of the field necessary for later courses.

In this course we will...

 Highlight some of the most interesting experiments within the field of psychology, discussing the implications of those studies for our understanding of the human mind and human behavior.

- 2. Explore the brain and some of the cognitive abilities it supports like learning, memory, perception, language, and consciousness.
- 3. Examine human development --- both in terms of growing up and growing older.
- 4. Discuss the manner in which the behaviors of others affect our own thoughts and behavior.
- 5. Discuss some of the mental disorders and the treatments.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Develop an overview of the field of psychology by studying and reflecting on the topics
- 2. Understand how psychologists take a scientific approach to human behavior and thought.
- 3. Practice the convention of scientific discourse appropriate to the audience, purpose and message.
- 4. Explain the real world phenomena by applying the concepts, theories, and methods learned in our course. Learning how to learn is a good start.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Basic computer skills, ability to use Microsoft Word and D2L.

Instructional Methods

This is an online course, which is not to be interpreted as self-paced. Rather, you are required to log on regularly (preferably every day) in order to succeed. You may consume the material at a more rapid pace than set by the below schedule, but assignments, quizzes, and exams will still take place according to the schedule. Quizzes and Exams will be open for 2-3 days, and if you are unable to complete the exam in this time frame, you must contact me ahead of time to re-schedule.

Student Responsibilities

Read the text: Read the chapter we are covering when it is assigned. This helps you in at least two ways: (1) it exposes you to the material before the lecture, making it easier for you to understand the lecture or supplemental material and thus get more out of it; and (2) it prepares you to complete the homework assignment.

Ask questions: If there is something you do not understand, ask questions. You may email me or ask in the designated Discussion Board in D2L.

Take notes: Take GOOD notes while you read (See D2L on *Good Note Taking*). It is a good study habit to go over your notes at the end of each week, filling in the blanks from the supplemental video(s) and assignment. It is also a good idea to make friends in the course and get the phone numbers of a couple of people who you can clarify notes with.

Utilize D2L: All instructions, due dates, and submission of graded material, are to be completed in D2L. Email submission will not be accepted. Please take some time to familiarize yourself with the system and contact me or IT with questions in advance.

Assessments

- **1.) Exams** (2 exams, total 80 points): Each exam is worth 40 points, consisting of 20-30 multiple choice questions, true/false, or short answers, and will cover the content from four chapters of the week. There will be 2 exams, not including the final, which is cumulative. Each exam during its designated week will open on Saturday at 12:01 am and will close on Sunday at 11:30 pm.
- 2.) Cumulative Final Exam (1 exam, total 50 points): The final exam will happen on the last day of class, June 1, 2022. The cumulative final consists of 30-40 questions that will vary in format but are likely to include multiple-choice, true-false, and fill-in-the-blank questions. The final exam will open at 12:01 am and close at 11:30 pm on Wednesday, June 1, 2022.
 - NO MAKE-UP EXAMS WILL BE GIVEN. All exams (including the final) will open on their assigned date at 12:01 am and close at 11:30 pm. Exams may be rescheduled, without penalty, only when arrangements have been made 48 hours in advance of the testing date and with a valid university excuse (see TAMUC Attendance). Please come to me within the first 2-3 days of class if you have conflicts with the exam dates. The final decision concerning make-up exams rests with me, the instructor. If no valid excuse is presented your exam grade is a zero.

You are responsible for all lecture/supplemental videos and reading materials. The exams are not open notes or textbooks and should be taken individually.

3.) Discussion Post (DP) (2 discussions, total 40 points): To encourage interaction between peers, creativity, and deeper processing of the information, there are two (2) discussion posts assignments including providing feedback to two peers' posts. The

discussion will come from content in the weekly reading. More details are provided in D2L. There are no make-up opportunities for missed or late submissions.

- **4.) Quizzes** (10 quizzes, total 100 points): To encourage participation, reading, and to ensure that you engage in content thoroughly, there will be ten (10) quizzes, one for each chapter you are expected to read. Each quiz will consist of 5 fill-in-the-blank or short answer questions, worth 2 points each. There are no make-up opportunities for missed or late submissions, please make sure you are completing your quiz daily Monday thru Thursday.
- **5.)** Essays Assignment (2 essays, total 20 points): Students will answer essay-style questions via an assignment upload in D2L. Posts should include insightful ideas and comments that are complete and well explained as well as defended by specific evidence. This does not require a direct quotation from sources. *Please use your own words and ideas*.

Posts should be at least 1.5 paragraphs but no more than 3 paragraphs in length. A paragraph consists of at least five sentences.

Posts will be graded as **pass/fail**. Posts that demonstrate the student has reviewed, understood, and contemplated the material will earn a passing grade. Posts that are weak, trivial, unclear, ungrammatical, or not defended by evidence will earn a failing grade.

There are five (5) questions in total. You must answer 2 of the 5 questions
