COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

University catalog description: Structure of the English Language. Three semester hours. A thorough analysis of the grammatical structure of English employing contemporary as well as more traditional methodologies. Emphasis varies among phonology, morphology, syntax, text/discourse analysis and historical developments in the language. Prerequisites: there are none.

This course introduces the major syntactic structures of English and the ways to analyze them. Topics include categories, phrases, functions, types of verbs, clauses, and finiteness. The course stresses that it is more important to be able to argue

something than just memorize rules. Some general linguistic issues, such as prescriptivism and descriptivism, varieties of English are discussed as well. This class is fully online. The class requires weekly work and assignments.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students will be able to describe the morphological and syntactic nature of English grammar in specific contexts.
- 2. Students will be able to develop skills in grammatical analysis, such as identifying parts of speech, analyzing sentences, and identifying and correcting errors.
- 3. Students will be able to demonstrate understanding in cultural issues related to English grammar.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Using the learning management system, using writing software and using presentation programs.

Instructional Methods

This is an online, asynchronous course. All the materials are available online. Live sessions are posted online the same day they are held on Zoom.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

Weekly assignments are required. Attendance to the weekly live class meeting is NOT required, but *watching the video is required*.

Reading the materials (as per the syllabus) is required PRIOR to the class meeting.

Posting in the Q&A is required between Monday and Thursday of each week. The Q&A score includes class participation. Full engagement in the discussion is required to score 2 points. Instructions on the Q&A are provided in the LMS.

Comprehension review (CR) quizzes are weekly and are required. Instructions on the CRs are provided in the LMS. The CRs open on Friday and close on Saturday.

If you score at the end of week 9 is > 90 you will not have to take the final exam and you will earn a grade of A for the class.

Instructions on the class project and extra credit are available in the LMS.
