# **Course Description**

It goes without saying that societies have problems—we experience them every day. But that doesn't mean we have to take them for granted. Can we understand them instead? Can we gain insight into what causes them, what perpetuates them, and what alleviates them? What do social problems look like through the scientific lens of sociological inquiry, distanced from the assumptions and interpretations we carry around with us in our daily lives? This course applies the insights of sociology and sociological research to various problems affecting our society. In doing so, it investigates causes, consequences, and the complications that attend attempts to address social problems. In doing so, however, it also provides resources for thinking

and acting in response to the problems that may bother you about the world in which you live. Social Problems critically engages students in the process of understanding the various dysfunctions of society, their complex dimensions, and their prospects for change.

Student Learning Outcomes (Should be measurable; observable; use action verbs)

Through this course, students should gain a basic operational sociological understanding of the causes and dynamics of social problems. Students will be able to apply various sociological theoretical perspectives to real-world problems and will become knowledgeable of relevant empirical evidence. Those who take this course will gain critical insight on the difficulties a number of key problems poses for societies. With a combination of evidence, theory, and engagement, the successful student will demonstrate an ability to step back from everyday reality and address the problems of social life from an informed perspective. This course will enhance not only students' growth as individuals, but will also expand their capacities for participation in the dialogue and conduct of a participatory republic.

- Sociological Knowledge: Students should be able to demonstrate a sociological
  perspective based on critical thinking in order to better understand the social world in
  which they live and interact on a daily basis. Assessed by: Assignments, Exams
- 2. Social Responsibility: Students will demonstrate an understanding of societal and/or civic issues. Assessed By: Discussion Board; Assignments
- 3. Sociological Application: Define and give examples of basic sociological terms and concepts that will help them better understand their social world and to lay a solid academic foundation for future courses in sociology and/or related fields. Assessed by: Overall course grades.
- 4. Global Awareness: Students will be able to demonstrate knowledge of the interconnectedness of global dynamics including global issues, processes, trends, and systems. Assessed by: Assignments; Discussion Board.
