Course Description

A study of selected current specific techniques used in the practice of psychotherapy. Students will study a set of clinical procedures based on different theoretical models, including cognitive behavioral therapy, psychodynamic psychotherapy, solution-focused psychotherapy, and others. Emphasis will be on techniques with evidence-based effectiveness and practical value in producing therapeutic movement, and students will

practice the procedures in controlled clinical settings. They will also be encouraged to develop an articulated practice model of their own. Prerequisites: <u>PSY 508</u> or consent of program advisor.

- 1. Students will conduct thorough clinical interviews.
- 2. Students will develop their own theoretical philosophy and utilize those techniques in mock therapy sessions.
- 3. Students will understand and form effective therapeutic relationships with mock clientele.
- 4. Students will understand and accept supervisory feedback, constructive criticism and modify techniques and interactions to be more effective with clientele.
- 5. Students will provide appropriate, respectful constructive criticism and encouragement to peers.
