Course Description

A study of ethical problems in the contemporary sport industry and the theoretical models available for analyzing these problems. Various governing agencies in sport, including those at the high school, collegiate, and professional levels will be studied, emphasizing investigation of the organizational structure, authority, membership and influence of these sport governing bodies.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, the student should able to:

• Discuss and understand governance issues facing the different levels of

- sport; including scholastic and intercollegiate athletics, international sport, and professional sport.
- Understand and discuss sport governing bodies; such as the NCAA and IOC.
- Understand and discuss ethical theories, and apply them to sport and recreation.
- Identify and investigate ethical and social issues in sport and recreation.

The sections will include the following:

<u>Quizzes</u>: You will take several multiple choice and true/false questions to test your understanding of the required readings (will be scored out of 25pts).

<u>Written/presentation assignments</u>: You will be asked to present and conduct a research paper on several issues/topics. These assignments will have instruction sheets and rubrics for them and will be graded out 100pts.

<u>Discussion</u>: There will be one large discussion in which the student is required to create an ethical dilemma in sport and lead the class in discussion/debate on the topic. This will be worth 25 points. The other part of this discussion is to engage with your classmates' threads. This will also be worth 25 points for a total of 50 points for the discussion grade.
