Course Description:

This course is designed to increase awareness and understanding of critical issues surrounding the evolving concept of literacy. This course will study selected issues affecting educational thought and schooling practices emphasizing critical analysis of the cultural, political, and sociological contexts of school-societal problems.

Objectives

Student Learning Outcomes (SLO):

1. To read, assess, and internalize the various interrelated components of reading and in reading instruction at the primary, intermediate/middle, or high school level.
2. Apply and share the knowledge gained as they become or continue to be literacy leaders, impact of the literacy program on students based on cultural factors, political factors, and sociological factors.
3. Articulate their analysis of readings through grand discussions postings via D2L discussions.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional / Methods / Activities Assessments:

A. Expectations: Students in this course are exposed to critical issues surrounding the evolving concept of literacy. This course will study selected issues affecting educational thought and schooling practices emphasizing analysis of the cultural, political, and sociological contexts of school-societal problems, diverse perspectives in the context of literacy assessments that will stretch your thoughts and perceptions beyond your present experiences and knowledge.

B. Assignments

1. **Module Assignments:** (50 points): In Modules 1-4 you will be asked several questions about the overarching critical literacy issue. (SLO 1, 2)

Each question must be answered using your own background, experiences, websites, and any other resources that you deem appropriate. Answers must be typed in a WORD document and submitted. **All resources must be cited using APA formatting.**

2. **Module Threaded Discussions:** (50 points): In Modules 1-4 you will be asked to respond to topic with talking points. You will be grouped into randomly selected groups to interact with. (SLO 2, 3)

In modules 1-4 you will be asked to share “talking points” you’ve collected from your reading of the assigned texts. They can be in the form of salient points, questions, points of disagreement, applications to teaching, or anything else you think is important. You will submit your talking points as well as share them on the discussion board. Students must participate in the threaded discussion by **posting by midnight Wednesday and responding to peers by midnight on Sunday**. In Module 5, you will be asked to share comments about your small group’s projects. points will be given for that too

3. **Letter to a Stakeholder** (40 points) (SLO 2)

Cassidy & Grote-Garcia share survey results of literacy topics that are seen as important to educators now. Considering your interests, *as well as your school district*, select a current topic that you believe is a significant topic in literacy in investigate further. You will write a letter to a stakeholder explaining why you believe this critical issue needs to be recognized more in your school and district.

4. **Critical Issues Multimodal Project (CIMP)** (60 points) (SLO 1, 2)

In this culminating project, you share your critical issue and recommendations digitally in a self-selected style. Components of the project must represent multi modalities.

- *revised for clarity and meaning
- *edited for accuracy in grammar and mechanics
- *saved on computer disk or copied on paper for your records
