Course Description

Heritage language learners are those individuals who are proficient in English and who grew up speaking another language at home; therefore, they can communicate, at some extend, in more than one language. The main purpose of the *Spanish for Heritage Speakers* courses at TAMUC is to build upon the language knowledge that students bring to the classroom and advance their Spanish proficiency and transcultural competence to successfully participate in different bi/multilingual contexts.

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Special attention is given to effective implementation of language learning strategies, critical analysis of Spanish language features, and development of multimodal composition skills. In addition, work on projects, readings, podcasts, short films, and class discussions seek to advance learners' understanding of cultural issues related to the Hispanic communities in the USA and abroad. Taught exclusively in Spanish, this course is designed for heritage or native speakers only. For students majoring or minoring in Spanish or bilingual education, this course substitutes the SPA 332 requirement.

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Describe and analyze Spanish language features, considering language variation, language ideologies and optionality in different registers and regional varieties.
2. Compare and contrast English and Spanish uses in the US, including main characteristics of US Spanish and translanguaging practices.
3. Explore and analyze diverse cultural topics related to language and identity, bilingualism, and cultural production in different Hispanic communities in the US.
4. Effectively plan, design and create a multimodal report to communicate individual perspectives on issues impacting Hispanics in the US.

Collection of Data for Measuring Institutional Effectiveness

In order to measure the level of compliance with the university's Institutional Effectiveness guidelines, I will collect some of the ungraded materials you will produce for the class. COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Student Responsibilities

Students' participation is essential and required to succeed in this intensive summer course. Students are expected to:

- a. read and prepare assigned materials by the due dates;
- b. complete and submit assignments by the due date; and
- c. interact with each other and the instructor on a regular basis.

In addition, students are expected to log-in into MyLeoOnline at least once a day during the workweek to check on messages, revise content, complete activities, and respond to forum postings.

Interaction with Instructor Statement

a. Course communication. Good communication in an online setting is a fundamental component of success. During the semester, we will use three main means of communication:

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- *Announcements:* General tool for course communication; I will post short messages or reminders related to due dates or changes in the assignments.

I will send general emails with information related to the course, date changes, assignments modifications, etc. or with information that relate to our content. I will send individual emails as needed. I will respond to emails in 24 hs. during the work week and by the next business day on weekends and holidays. - *General Discussion Board:* Located in the “Recursos” folder, this board is open to all participants; anyone can post a comment, question or suggestion related or unrelated to the course. All students are encouraged to participate and post responses; I will visit this board regularly.

b. Feedback and assessment: You will be received detailed feedback on your HW, discussion posts and other tasks 72 hours after the activity is due (see the ‘Tentative Course Schedule’ for details). Participation in the online meetings and discussion boards will be assessed through a comprehensive rubric (see the “Course Resources” folder for details), which includes timeliness.

Minimal Technical Skills

Students in this course are expected to:

- a. access, navigate and use the diverse tools included in the course shell (MyLeoOnline -D2L). This includes how to turn-in assignments, how to upload video and audio recordings, how to participate and respond in the discussion boards, and how to access and use the quiz tool. See the *Introduction* folder for more details.
- b. manage TAMUC Library resources for academic research. See the *Resources* folder for details;
- c. competently use MSFT Office tools (Word, Excel, PPoint).

Course Content and Activities

This online course will be delivered through TAMUC’s MyLeoOnline (D2L) platform. You will use your TAMUC MyLeo account to access the platform and navigate the course content, which includes short video presentations, readings, multimedia materials, discussion threads, and video conferencing tools. The course is organized around four learning units which focus on relevant cultural and social aspects of different Hispanic communities, and on analysis and discussion of Spanish language features and their usages. Students are expected to complete daily tasks based on readings, videos and short presentations; tasks are submitted on Wednesdays and Fridays. Each unit will require about 12-15 hours to complete.

Activities & assessments

1. Conversaciones (32% of final grade). Participation in this course will be completed by engaging in the weekly discussion boards (*Foros de Conversación*), and in the two in-person virtual meetings during the first and final weeks of the semester.

Based on the weekly readings, videos, and assignments, you will participate in four discussion boards sharing your ideas on the content. The discussion board topic will include cases-studies, podcasts/ videos, or set of questions related to the readings and complementary materials. You will participate

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posting answers to these activities by means of critical interpretation, offering counter-examples or discussing a particular topics. Students are expected to complete a minimum of 3 posting each week (original post + 2 responses or more, each post about 200 words in Spanish). Postings will be evaluated for content understanding, reasoning, collaboration, and language conventions usage. See the *Discussion Board Rubric* in the 'Resources' folder for more details.

In addition, students are expected to participate in two virtual meetings (first and final week); the first meeting will focus on questions about course content and tasks; the second meeting will serve to informally present the research project conducted during the course. Please follow [Netiquette rules](#) to keep our conversation professional, engaging, and polite.

2. Units HW (48% of the final grade) You will be assigned two weekly tasks focusing on: a) reading and aural interpretation of Spanish discourse [Wednesdays], and b) language analysis and practice tasks [Fridays]. Those activities are individual, original work that shows student's daily interaction with the course content. Most of them are based on the textbook activities but some involve completing short research on the internet. HW activities will be evaluated based on: a) completion, b) accuracy, and c) originality. 3. Research project (20% of the final grade). You will research and analyze detailed information about a non-profit organization in the North Texas area to better understand their work and impact in the diverse communities of this area. The research will lead to the production of a multimodal report in Spanish, which will include your analysis of a pertinent social issue (*housing, food insecurity, education; health, etc...*) affecting communities in the area, and your personal analysis on the work the non-profit organization does. Your work will include: audiovisual and written segments (including a data from interviews), photos/ images, and relevant links.
