COURSE INFORMATION

Textbook(s) Required:

No textbook is required for purchase. Assigned readings and videos will be accessed via D2L and online through TAMUC library.

Course Description

A survey of the visual arts from Early Renaissance to approximately 1980 throughout the Western and Nonwestern world. Major examples of architecture, sculpture and painting will be examined in relation to their social and cultural context.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Students will demonstrate a knowledge of major art works and articulate their significance within the context of sequential historical periods to understand the development of the visual arts against the patterns and chronology of human history.
- 2. Students will demonstrate an understanding of terminology on concepts an art and art history.
- 3. Students will demonstrate an understanding of major artists and of their influence in their respective cultures.
- 4. To see the ways in which art reflects or communicates social, political, ideological, and religious values and constructions.
- 5. To learn themes and meanings embodied in works of art.
- 6. To recognize the interconnections between art and other expressions of human activity, such as literature, science, economics, music, and theatre.

Course Instruction Methods and Student Expectations:

This course requires regular class attendance, weekly reading assignments, and viewing of videos. Assignments include discussion posts, visual style guides, and quizzes. Students should expect to spend nine (9) hours each week completing the course requirements and understand that the material covered in this course is the same amount as that of a regular semester.
