COURSE OVERVIEW AND OBJECTIVES:

This course is an introduction to the concepts, principles, problems, and practices of Supply Chain Management.

In this course students will use qualitative and quantitative information to design, manage, and improve the supply chain.

Learning Objectives:

- The student will use qualitative and quantitative information to design supply chains.
- The student will use qualitative and quantitative information to manage supply chain operations
- The student will use qualitative and quantitative information to improve the supply chain
- The student will use SAP to manage material in the supply chain. (Evaluated in the SAP assignments)
- The student will know the major tasks associated with managing supply chains. (Evaluated on Final Exam)
- The student will use data to make visual representations that support decision making.
 - The student will summarize data. (Evaluated in metrics assignment and Final Exam)

- The student will use process design components in their design, management, and improvement of the supply chain.
- The student will incorporate ethics components in making decisions about supply chains.
