# **ORGANIZATION LEADERSHIP PROGRAM DESCRIPTION**

The Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences in Organizational Leadership (ORGL) degree is a competencybased program that prepares innovative leaders for employment in an increasingly technological and global society. This program provides opportunities for students to receive credit for what they know and can do already, allows them to accelerate completion of their degree, and — because it is fully online students are able to plan their study schedule around the rest of their day to complete the coursework.

# **Competency Cluster Description**

This two-term course examines the role of quantitative data in managerial and entrepreneurial decisionmaking. The course draws upon quantitative tools and analyses from several disciplines, especially, statistics, economics, accounting, and finance. The course study demonstrates the usefulness of these tools and analyses in providing optimal technical options in decision-making situations. The emphasis of the course is on the interpretation and translation of data into information for the benefit of internal and external consumers.

# **COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES**

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Understand the roles of different types of data (financial, economic, accounting, etc.).
- 2. Identify and select data that should be collected.
- 3. Utilize varied methodologies for collecting necessary data.
- 4. Know how to interpret collected data.

5. Understand the importance of statistics and statistical thinking in improving situations or solving problems

6. Select and utilize appropriate format for presentation and/or analysis of data.

# **REGULAR AND SUBSTANTIVE COURSE INTERACTION**

As a general guide, students enrolled in a three semester hour course should spend one hour engaged in instructional activities and two to three hours on out-of-class work per week in a traditional semester. Students are expected to double this effort of engagement given that this course is being delivered in a seven-week term. Educational activities in this course are designed to ensure regular and substantive interaction between students and faculty to ensure that students are able to demonstrate competency.

# ASSESSMENT

Students must achieve 80% or higher for the both the posttest and culminating project to demonstrate competency and pass the course.

## **Course Pre-test**

The purpose of the pre-test is to provide a baseline understanding of your knowledge in this competency. The pretest is required before you begin studying course materials. If you do not make at least 80% on the pre-test, students will be expected to complete assignments, quizzes, and other course content to prepare for the post-test and culminating project.

Pre- test	This is the initial assessment in the course to provide a baseline understanding of a student's knowledge of the course content and competencies. Pretests are taken once and should be completed upon the first couple of days of a CBE academic term or entry into a course if a student is an accelerator.	100 points	Required before completing any other work in the course. The grade on the pre-test does <b>not</b> count in the final grade for this course.

# **Required Assignments, Discussions, and Satisfactory Course Completion**

The two elements that determine the final grade will be the culminating project (e.g. workbook) and posttest. Everything else completed in the course is to scaffold and support learning and demonstration of competency. Generally, there are two paths in a course:

<u>Student Pretest Grade  $\geq$  80% - Student may progress directly to complete the posttest then culminating</u> project. It is highly suggested that students review course content so that it may be properly applied to the posttest and culminating project.

<u>Student Pretest Grade < 80% -</u> Student is expected to <u>read and watch course content</u>, <u>answer learning</u> <u>objective essay questions</u>, <u>and complete learning objective quizzes</u>. These activities are designed to prepare students for the posttest. The instructor should provide feedback on these items to prepare students for the posttest. These activities will be part of the grade.

#### **Learning Objective Quizzes**

A brief assessment at the end of each module that is intended to emphasize key concepts, theories, processes, etc., introduced in the Learning Objective Module. Quizzes are factored into final grade.

#### **Course Post-test**

The end-of-course comprehensive exam that assesses student knowledge and understanding of major concepts, theories, processes, etc., in the course. A **score of 80% or higher is required** to demonstrate competency.

If you score less than 80% on the post-test, you will have an opportunity to review the material and retake the post-test two additional times. If the posttest score is less than 80% within three attempts, students will receive a grade of "F" in the course and will be required to retake the course in the new term. Students who fail the posttest should review feedback from the instructor before reattempting the posttest.

## GRADING

A score of 80% or higher on both the Culminating Project and Posttest is required to demonstrate competency and receive credit for the course. The following items will be used to calculate the final grade in the course.

#### **Grading Scale**

The project assesses your knowledge of terms and the application of concepts presented in this course. A **score of 80% or higher is required** to demonstrate competency.

If students score less than 80% on the culminating project, they will have an opportunity to review the material. Complete Culminating Project with an 80% or better: Finalize project based on instructor feedback, making final edits where necessary and upload project to the documents section of your ePortfolio. Complete POST-TEST - Scoring 80% or higher: Student earning 80% or higher on the POSTTEST after submitting a FINAL Artifact have successfully complete the course in Organizational Change.

Students scoring less than 80% will have the opportunity to retake the POSTTEST after a review of material. Students may resubmit the project up to two additional times. If the culminating project is less than 80% within three attempts, students will receive a grade of "F" in the course and will be required to retake the course in the new term.
