ORGANIZATION LEADERSHIP PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences in Organizational Leadership (ORGL) degree is a competency-based program that prepares innovative leaders for employment in an increasingly technological and global society. This program provides opportunities for students to receive credit for what they know and can do already, allows them to accelerate completion of their degree, and — because it is fully online — students are able to plan their study schedule around the rest of their day to complete the coursework.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course requires an analysis, synthesis, and evaluation of the student's knowledge and skills including academic performance, teamwork experience, and workplace experience. Using current information, technology and resources the student will construct a professional profile. Students use problem-solving skills to analyze, evaluate and recommend an implementation plan addressing an

organizational leadership issue or problem. A main factor in evaluating student performance is the input from multiple stakeholders including employers and faculty.

- 1. Create a complete and comprehensive strategic case analysis about an organization of your choice, supporting that case with connections to ORGL content and external references.
- 2. Reflect and evaluate on knowledge, skills, and experiences learned from all ORGL courses that demonstrates academic performance in meeting program competencies and produce a video presentation illustrating knowledge.
- 3. Create a professional ePortfolio presenting your academic and professional artifacts.
